

FOUR IN OPEN BOAT, BLOWN TO SEA IN GALE, ARE SAVED

Brooklynites Motorboat Is Sunk and All Take to Their Trailer.

CROP DAMAGE HEAVY Jersey Peaches Are Hit Hard; Early Strawberry Plantings Abandoned.

FROST KILLS BLOSSOMS Reports From East, South and West Tell of Havoc by Fall in Temperature.

The wild northwester that smote this neighborhood on Monday evening, leaving a trail of wreckage in its wake, subsided to half a gale yesterday and finally died down to a brisk breeze. It had caused the phenomenal drop in temperature of 53 degrees in fifteen hours, or from 78 at 3:30 P. M. on Monday to 25 at 6:30 A. M. yesterday.

Reports of mishaps caused by the great blow in this neighborhood continued to drift in yesterday. The American steamship West Hemanite picked up at 11 o'clock on Monday night off Ambrose Channel Lightship and landed yesterday at Quarantine Mr. and Mrs. Walter Javon of Sixteenth street, Brooklyn, and that Javon's two children who were exhausted in their struggle to keep afloat in a twenty-six foot open boat. They left the boat at Twenty-first street, Brooklyn, early in the afternoon in a motor boat, towing the open boat, bound for Rockaway Inlet.

They were hit by the storm soon after getting under way in the open boat. The boat was swamped and sunk. They took to the other boat and the boat carried them out to sea. Unprepared for the change in temperature, all were badly chilled when discovered.

Harold Williams, Charles Mahoney and Edward Maguire, all of Elton street, Brooklyn, were blown away from their motorboat at Canarsie Monday afternoon and left the Old Mill for a fishing trip in Jamaica Bay. They did not get home until yesterday afternoon, after their parents had the police send out a general alarm for them and preparations had been made to search for their bodies. Williams, the oldest, was so weak that he was taken to St. Mary's Hospital. They were driven on a marsh by the gale and had not been able to get off until six hours later, when the tide was in.

Then they started to row, but in the darkness lost all sense of direction. They blundered their hands rowing and finally lay down in the bottom of the boat, while the other, Williams, kept her head above the waves. When dawn came the trio took to the oars and rowed in the general direction of Canarsie. Just before noon they sighted the Old Mill, where their mothers and some of their boy neighbors were waiting to greet them.

Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson, wife of Reuben Wilson, District Attorney of Brooklyn, was walking beside her ten-year-old daughter, Isabel, with Jeanette, two and a half years old, in a baby carriage, when a fierce squall hit them. The mother and Isabel were blown down and the baby carriage was overturned. They were bruised and scratched, but the greatest calamity was the disappearance down the line of the new Easter hats of Mrs. Wilson and Isabel.

CRONKHITE SLAYER ON WAY TO TACOMA

Pothier Will Face Charge Resulting From Killing of Major at Camp Lewis.

Despatches from Tacoma, Wash., last night said that Roland K. Pothier, a former army sergeant, arrested recently in Providence, R. I., where he is said to have confessed to the shooting of Major Alexander Cronkhite at Camp Lewis in October, 1918, was on the way to Tacoma to stand trial on an indictment returned against him by the Federal Grand Jury there. James W. Selden, Prosecuting Attorney of Tacoma, said that he was preparing also to press in the State courts the charges against Pothier.

Additional mystery was thrown about the Cronkhite case last night when Detective Mahoy of Bellevue Hospital reported yesterday that a woman, who appeared at the Police Headquarters with a prisoner whose name he gave as "James Brown of Providence, R. I.," and asked that Brown be detained as a Federal prisoner. The woman did not state the nature of the charge, but it was rumored that the man might be Pothier, who left Providence last Friday to be brought here.

At that time it was stated that Pothier would be brought to New York to confront Rosenberg, but later it was said that this was not true. There all information concerning his whereabouts was refused and just what would be done with the former sergeant continued to be a mystery.

Robert Rosenberg, a former army Captain, arrested recently on a warrant sworn out in Tacoma charging him with the murder of Major Cronkhite, was released on \$25,000 bail yesterday by Judge Knox in the United States District Court. Securities to this amount were furnished by three R. Rosenbluths, friends, Felix M. Warburg, Horbert H. Lehman and Walter E. Frank. Under the terms of the bail bond Rosenberg is directed to proceed to Tacoma to answer the charges in the Western district of Washington. Before his arraignment before Judge Knox Rosenberg was taken before Samuel M. Hitchcock, United States Commissioner, who received examination in removal proceedings. At the hearing an amended complaint was introduced which charged him with premeditated murder of Cronkhite.

Rosenbluth does not expect to go to Tacoma until he receives word that the Federal Grand Jury has acted and that his presence is necessary.

BOY WAYLAIN IN HALL; \$1,000 SAVINGS GONE East Side Chase of Four Bandits Is Unsuccessful.

Urban Urbanikwa, a bus boy employed in Libby's restaurant in 126 Delancey street, started into the tenement house in 215 avenue A, where he lives, last night with his entire fortune of \$1,000 sewed in the inside pocket of his coat. He was about half way up the stairs, according to the story he told the police, when he was attacked by four men who choked him until he dropped to the floor, and then robbed him of his money.

Urbanikwa managed to struggle to his feet as the men ran from the tenement, and followed them, crying "Stop thief." A crowd joined him, but the bandits made their escape. The bus boy could not describe his assailants, except that they were caps. He told the police that during the war he served with Battery C, 16th Field Artillery.
