

SOCIALISTS BARRED BY COOPER UNION

Their Presence on Speakers' List Reason for Forbidding Deb's Meeting.

'WERE DISLOYAL IN WAR' Free Speech or Debs Personally Not Issue, Explains R. Fulton Cutting.

R. Fulton Cutting, president of the board of trustees of Cooper Union, gave yesterday the reason for forbidding the use of that place of assembly for a meeting intended to arouse sentiment favoring the pardoning of Eugene Debs and others who tried to interfere with American effort in the war.

"I have no objection," Mr. Cutting said, "to a public meeting being called in the Cooper Union auditorium to advocate the release of Eugene Debs, but I object to letting the hall for that purpose to a committee in the membership of which I see the names of individuals who in my judgment were thoroughly disloyal during the war."

The amnesty committee to which Mr. Cutting referred has among its members Jeremiah O'Leary, Morris Hillquit, Algoner Lee, Charles W. Ervin, the Rev. John Haynes Holmes, the Rev. Judah Magnes, Benjamin Schlesinger, Ernest Bohm, and Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch. Its director is Adolph Gerner. The committee intends to have a mass meeting next week.

On Monday Mr. Gerner asked the assistant secretary at Cooper Union for its open dates and was told that April 4 and 5 were open. He was asked to submit the committee list and the names of probable speakers for the meeting, and did so. The speakers' names were Morris Hillquit, Philip Francis, the Rev. Dr. Holmes, Dr. Magnes and E. H. Rouse, president of the typographical union. Later in the day Mr. Gerner was informed at Cooper Union that "they do not want that meeting here."

The Socialists professed to be greatly shocked. They had much to say yesterday about the dedication of Cooper Union to the cause of free speech, of Lincoln's speech there in 1859 and of that of Debs himself in 1895.

C. R. Richards, director of Cooper Union, said yesterday: "The decision of the board of trustees is in pursuance of the policy adopted during the war of not allowing the auditorium to be used for Socialist meetings, because the Socialists, by their party platform, have taken their place in the war. The trustees have given their president, Mr. Cutting, absolute authority over the use of the hall."

The amnesty committee will try to find another place for its meeting.

DAUGHERTY DENIES DEBS GOT OFFER OF FREEDOM

Harding to Get Opinion Based on Recent Visit.

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Legislation to solve the problem of prisoners confined for violation of the war time laws is now under consideration, Attorney General Daugherty said today. Senators Sterling and King and other members of the Senate Judiciary committee, he said, had asked Mr. Daugherty to confer with them and present his ideas on the question. He added, a bill already having been introduced to cover the matter.

Mr. Daugherty said published reports that Eugene V. Debs, imprisoned at Atlanta for violation of the espionage act, had been offered freedom during his recent conference with the Attorney General here on promise to abandon the spread of Bolshevist doctrines were without foundation.

The Debs case, Mr. Daugherty said, would be the subject of careful investigation on which an opinion would be transmitted to President Harding. Meanwhile, he added, he would not discuss it.

DAVIS INSANITY PLEA WILL NOT BE OPPOSED

State to Resist Attempt to Prove Slayer Is Sane Now.

It became known yesterday that the State will not oppose the defence of insanity now believed to have been prepared by the attorneys for Charles T. Davis, Brooklyn chemist, who killed Detective Joseph Bridgetta in his office on February 18. District Attorney Harry E. Lewis of Brooklyn let it be known, however, that any attempt by the defence to prove that Davis was sane at the time of the murder he is now sane, will be fought vigorously.

If the chemist is declared insane Mr. Lewis will ask for his commitment to the State Hospital at Matteawan.

According to information in the hands of the District Attorney, Davis' father died in Matteawan on May 21, 1905. He had been convicted of conspiracy in connection with a transaction in railroad securities, fined \$250 and sentenced to a term in the penitentiary, Mr. Lewis said.

Davis already has been examined by alienists employed by his counsel. He will be examined soon by alienists for the State.

ACCEPTS STOKES CHALLENGE.

Wallace, Named as Corespondent, Files Notice of Appearance.

Edgar T. Wallace, oil man from California, who was named as corespondent in an amended complaint made during the trial of W. E. D. Stokes' suit for divorce against Helen Elwood Stokes, filed yesterday a notice of appearance in the County Clerk's office.

The notice states that Wise, Whitney & Parker of 11 William street have been engaged as Mr. Wallace's legal representatives and contains a demand that copies of the summons and amended complaint be served upon them.

COST OF VEHICLE TUBE APPROACHES DISCUSSED

Commissioners Try to Dissipate Deadlock Suggestions.

Distribution of the cost of widening the Jersey City approaches to the new vehicular tunnel was discussed yesterday at a joint meeting of the New York and New Jersey Interstate Bridge and Tunnel Commissions. The meeting ended with the adoption by the New York members of a resolution calling on the Jersey City authorities for an official statement as to whether the proposed widening of Fourteenth street, Jersey City, is a condition upon which they would insist before authorizing the closing of Eleventh street. Members of the commission sought to dissipate every suggestion that they had made dead-end over the matter of charging street widening costs in Jersey City to tunnel construction.

The New York Commissioners evidently felt that the proposal to charge the cost of widening Fourteenth street, Hendon street, Twelfth street and Jersey avenue to the construction work was in the nature of an added consideration and not included in the estimates first made by Clifford M. Holland, chief engineer. On the other hand, the New Jersey members contended that in order to obtain full revenue from tunnel operation the charges in Jersey City should be levied to be widened, and that the work would be a proper charge against the total cost of the job.

At the meeting, next Tuesday, the question will be taken up again.

AMERICAN WOMAN TO AID OPIUM FIGHT

Mrs. Wright's Selection Seen as Tribute to Work of Herself and Husband.

The appointment of Mrs. Hamilton Wright of Washington as one of the three assessors chosen by the Council of the League of Nations to assist the advisory committee on traffic in opium has been received here as a fitting tribute to the work done by herself and her late husband, Dr. Hamilton Wright, in combating the opium evil.

The advisory committee on traffic in opium was created by the council during its recent meeting at Paris in accordance with a resolution adopted by the assembly. It will consist of one representative from each of the following countries: Holland, Great Britain, France, India, Japan, China, Siam and Portugal. The active work of the committee will be done by three assessors chosen exclusively with regard to their special knowledge of the question, without regard to nationality. They will be Sir John Jordan of Great Britain, Mona Henri of France and Mrs. Hamilton Wright, the travelling expenses and subsistence allowance of the assessors will be paid by the league.

The first meeting of the advisory committee will be held some time during April, in order that a report on the opium situation all over the world will be ready for the council not later than June. This report will include detailed statements in regard to all measures adopted by the various countries for the control of the traffic in opium and other dangerous drugs. Under the resolution adopted by the assembly a special invitation will be addressed to the United States to take part in the work of the committee. Dr. Hamilton Wright after he has been rendered incapable of carrying it on, Dr. Hamilton Wright was one of the principal anti-opium workers during his life and was known as such all over the world.

He acted as the representative of this country at the Hague Convention on Narcotics and later he went to Paris as a member of the Peace Commission. While there he was killed in a street accident.

RAT SQUAD AT WORK.

Poisoned Bread Distributed Between Corona and Flushing.

A "rat squad" of the Department of Health will begin operations on the meadows lying between Corona and Flushing along the route of the Long Island Railroad within a few days, it was announced yesterday. The squad is composed of poisoning out of existence rats which have been finding their way into the neighboring towns. Instead of trying to charm the rats the squad will deposit in convenient places poisoned bread sufficient to kill 50,000 medium sized rats. It is believed there is quite possibly that number of rats in the meadows.

'CRAZY AND A LIAR' INSULT BY KILROE

Swann Aid Admits He Used These Terms to Mrs. Bourasse in Motor.

NO ATTEMPT TO CARESS His Appellations Followed Her Charge He Was Double-Crossing Her.

The alleged "insult" by Assistant District Attorney Edwin P. Kilroe of Mrs. Mariette Montrose St. Marie Bourasse, motion picture actress and third wife of Napoleon A. Bourasse, broker, was described by him when he resumed the stand yesterday in his defence in the trial before Supreme Court Justice Weeks, in which he and Louis E. Swartz, formerly his law partner, are charged with conspiracy and failure to prosecute Bourasse.

While motoring in New Rochelle to call upon a sister of Mrs. Mary Coyne Bourasse's second wife, Mr. Kilroe said he told the actress he feared her bigamy action could not be upheld in court. "She accused me of double-crossing her and siding with her husband," he said. "I told her she was crazy and a liar. These words were what Mrs. Bourasse referred to when she testified I had insulted her."

"No, I'm not a automobile driver," his counsel questioned. The afternoon was devoted to the introduction of numerous letters written by Mr. Kilroe to various police chiefs in the United States and Canada to prove his diligence in investigating the antecedents of Bourasse.

William Rand, prosecuting the case, brought up at a right session the question of Bourasse's probable perjury in swearing to his applications for licenses for marriages two and three. Such a charge in regard to the second marriage, in Manhattan, was outlawed, Mr. Kilroe explained. The other application was not made in this country.

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DEMANDS UNION GAS USE 12 MILLION FUND

State Argues Against Proposed Boost in Rates.

Argument on the motion to confirm the report of James G. Graham, special master in the suit started by the Brooklyn Union Gas Company, which seeks to set aside the present statutory rate of eight cents, was heard yesterday by Judge Julius M. Mayer in the Federal District Court. The suit is directed against Charles D. Newton, State Attorney-General, Alfred M. Barrett, Public Service Commissioner, and Harry E. Lewis, District Attorney of Kings County.

In his report, Mr. Graham found the State gas rate law unconstitutional because confiscatory, and therefore not allowing the Brooklyn company a proper return on its investment. If the court confirms the report the gas company will be free to increase its rates. Under a court ruling the company tentatively is charging \$1.10 pending the outcome of its litigation.

Wilbur W. Chambers, State Assistant Attorney-General, representing the defendants, argued that the company had accumulated a fund amounting to \$12,589,976.13 for contingencies, and asked that the State statute not be declared confiscatory until that fund is exhausted.

Politically speaking, the village of Tarrytown, Camden county, N. J., is ideal. This was stated positively yesterday by the Camden County Board of Elections after a count of the votes at a recent election. It was found that every one of the nineteen members of the colony entitled to have his say voted, and that every one of the voters was elected to an office. The election, to tell nothing but the truth, was held so that the village might be incorporated, and the corporation has been formed so that the residents may exercise their own sweet will in playing Sunday golf. Local opinion was what was sought.
