

ELWELL SUSPECT EXPECTED ARREST

Man Now Sought Rushed to Engage Counsel at Time of Murder.

MOVEMENTS CHECKED UP

Whitman Engaged in Studying Papers Turned Over to Him by Swann.

Although officials in charge of the Joseph B. Elwell murder investigation continue to maintain silence, it was reported yesterday in the Criminal Courts Building that a man about whom they are centering their investigation engaged an attorney after Elwell's death and made elaborate preparations to fight any charge that might be brought against him.

It was reported further, although because of the silence of those charged with the investigation it could not be verified officially, that this man's movements on the night previous to, and the very morning of, the murder are being checked up. Corroborating witnesses will be reexamined, it is declared, in connection with this man's story. Charles S. Whitman has not completed his examination of the evidence in the case turned over to him Friday by District Attorney Swann. His opinion of the case, if he has expressed it, is known only to his aids who have preceded him in a reexamination of the evidence.

CHURCH RECEIPTS GROW.

An increase of more than \$800,000 in the receipts of the central receiving agency of the Presbyterian New Era Movement over the previous fiscal year closing April 1 was reported yesterday by the publicity department of the church at 126 Fifth avenue. The sum received from March 31, 1920, to April 1, 1921, was \$2,136,276, as against \$1,336,023 for the year before. The total March receipts were \$655,757, or about \$100,000 more than last year. The sum of \$415,000 which has been received and paid to the Interchurch World Movement was included in the annual report.

BUILT DUPLICATE SHOP TO WIN TRADE, CHARGE

Harlem Credit Firm Sues Neighbor for 'Deception.'

The dilemma that faces shoppers in Harlem's West 125th street when they want to buy clothing on credit and find themselves before No. 121 and No. 123—stores alike as pens in their novel window and entrance arrangements—will be put up to Supreme Court Justice DeLoach to-morrow morning for solution. Abe Golden and several partners, who do business in No. 121 under the name of the Hygrade Credit Clothing Company, will seek a permanent injunction against Max Landau and Aaron Streifer, who are the United Credit Company, in 123. The Hygrade company, according to Golden's affidavit, built up in less than three years a business of \$500,000 yearly. In the spring of 1919 they got a long lease on 121 and employed Samuel Roth, architect and builder, to renovate the establishment until the result, as Roth describes it, was "artistic and unique."

Last year, his affidavit continues, the defendant concern "leased 123 and employed Roth to alter the building on exactly the same plans as he used in 121. Ever since, Golden alleges, the Hygrade customers with charge accounts have dropped into the United by mistake, offering the defendant money they owed him, and many old customers have been deceived into the belief they were patronizing the Hygrade when they were in 123.

RIGHT TO SUE AS WIFE DENIED IN ANSWER

Mrs. Evelyn Ide of 573 West 142d street, filed yesterday with the County Clerk a belated answer to an action for alienation in which \$100,000 damages is sought, begun against her in January by Mrs. Margaret McEwen. In it she bases her defense on the allegation that Mrs. McEwen was never the legal wife of John E. McEwen, since he was married to a Miss Beale Cottrell in New York in July, 1900, and the marriage has never been annulled.

The McEwens, whose present address is not given, were married October 11, 1919. In her complaint Mrs. McEwen recited that when they were living in St. Louis, Mo., in February, 1920, Mrs. Ide alienated her husband's affections "by offers of money, gifts, automobile rides and luxuries," and that she "induced him to live with her in New York, Chicago and Harrisburg, Pa."
