In her divorce papers, filed in the Court of Chancery in Trenton by Furst & Furst of Newark, Mrs. Maud Andrews charges her husband with acts of infidelity committed with Esther M. Tattler in Jersey City on April 7 and on other days this month. She asks for the custody of the two children, John, E. and Harley, 6, who are now with her. She says that the two Andrews were married by the Rev. James F. Algin in Portland, Me., June 17, 1912. She asks for an allowance, sum not specified, for the support of herself and the children and for permission to resume her maiden name, Maud Augusta Haynes.
