

### FREE TOLLS FIGHT BEGINS THIS WEEK

Republicans in Senate Divided on Wisdom of Borah Measure.

### IS PLATFORM PLEDGE

Speculation as to How Vigorously President Will Press for Passage.

### DEMOCRATS ARE PLEASED

Will Give 'Aid and Comfort' to Opposition to Party Measure.

There will be a split in the Republican majority of the Senate on the bill to grant free tolls to American ships using the Panama Canal. The fight is likely to begin next week. Senator Borah (Idaho), Chairman of the Committee on Inter-oceanic Canals, will bring the bill before his committee in a few days.

Although the Republican platform declares in favor of free tolls it is now apparent that a group of Republican Senators who are on record against the proposal will maintain their ground.

Nevertheless Senator Borah, author of the free tolls bill, hopes to get it through the Senate. He believes his committee will report it favorably after consideration. Senator Borah said he believed the subject was so thoroughly understood because of previous hearings that new hearings would not be necessary. He did not speak for the committee on this point.

When President Wilson asked repeal of free tolls early in his first Administration he sent a message to Congress intimating there was some mysterious but compelling diplomatic reason why the repeal should be voted. This reason never has been disclosed and many Republicans and some Democrats believe Mr. Wilson overstated the matter in order to help the passage of the repeal bill.

When he forced the repeal bill through Congress Mr. Wilson went contrary to the Democratic platform on which he was elected.

Although President Harding referred to the free tolls plank in the Republican platform during his campaign, he did not press for passage of the bill in his message at the opening of Congress. How vigorously he will push the matter is still a matter of doubt.

The Democrats welcome the idea of another division in the Republican ranks such as occurred on the Colombian treaty and are preparing to make the most of it by giving "aid and comfort" to the Republican opponents of free tolls.

### Princeton Campus Will Have Apartment House

PRINCETON, April 23.—A shortage of housing accommodations for the staff of professors and instructors at Princeton University has made it necessary for the trustees to set a precedent. The campus is to have an apartment house.

The faculty apartments, which will probably be located near the new Moses Taylor Pyne dormitory, will provide housing for professors and their families.

### LEGION SAYS SLACKERS ARE FLEEING TO CUBA

Still Fighting to Have List of Dodgers Published.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—While the Government is marking time in publication of the list of slackers large numbers of guilty draft evaders are leaving the country, according to John Thomas Taylor, vice-chairman of the national legislative committee of the American Legion.

"Just the other day," Mr. Taylor said, "an ex-soldier came all the way from Tampa to Washington for the express and sole purpose of informing the Department of Justice that dozens of these men were beating it to Cuba." "The American Legion is disgusted at the underhanded campaign the disloyal elements have waged against the publication of these slacker lists. Step by step we have fought them until at last the War Department was brought to the point of making the lists public."

### FOREIGN BORN TOTAL IN U. S. NOW 13,703,987

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The foreign born population of the United States in 1920 totaled 13,703,987, an increase of 358,442, or 2.6 per cent. over 1910.

### \$4,500,000,000 TO MEET NEEDS OF U. S.

Size of Authorized and Expected Appropriations Shows Need for Budget System.

### CAN SAVE BILLION A YEAR

House Committee Chairman to Urge Bill's Passage—Large Tax Cut Impossible.

The total amount of money which must be paid out of the United States Treasury as the result of annual Congressional appropriations during the first six months of this year and the continuing permanent appropriations probably will exceed \$4,500,000,000, official reports of the Senate and House Appropriations committees show.

Any considerable reduction of taxes will be extremely difficult because of this big total, Congressional leaders admit. "The amount is virtually the same as allowed last year, but it is shown that 'war overhang,' which continues to demand large sums, makes a big reduction impossible."

To date annual appropriations representing those made directly by Congress since January 1 total \$2,470,253,285. This includes the Army bill as passed by both houses last session and the Navy bill as passed by the House. The Army bill was pocket vetoed by President Wilson, and the Naval bill, as reported by the Senate Naval Affairs Committee, was \$90,000,000 greater.

The permanent appropriations authorized by previous sessions, but continued unless the current Congress acts otherwise, total \$1,326,776,200. Nearly all this amount represents the interest on the public debt and the sinking fund by which Liberty bonds are purchased and retired.

The total cost of the annual and permanent appropriations which may be considered as approved thus is \$3,797,029,486. To the credit of Congress it should be said that this amount is \$1,463,486,926 less than the amounts requested by the Executive Department. Within the last week, however, the House Appropriation Committee has received word that additional appropriations totaling at least \$700,000,000 will be needed. Director General of Railroads Davis has informed Mr. Good that another appropriation of \$400,000,000 will be needed to pay railroad administration losses; the Shipping Board will need \$170,000,000; the Federal Board for Vocational Education has asked for \$15,000,000; and miscellaneous requests total about \$50,000,000.

### CO-EDS' MORAL CONDUCT NO BOTHER OF COLLEGE DEANS

Illinois Parents Must Attend to That—Girls Living in "Clean, Healthy Age," It Is Found.

Special Despatch to THE NEW YORK HERALD, CHICAGO, April 23.—Parents whose daughters attend coeducational institutions in Illinois are to receive a circular letter from the women deans telling them they must teach their girls self-reliance, and saying the schools cannot be responsible for their moral conduct.

This was decided on by the deans of women's colleges at a meeting at Northwestern University, where they looked into the co-ed problem from many angles. Hosiery, thin dresses, toddle dances, bobbed hair and other features that set the modern co-ed apart from her predecessors were discussed, with the general consensus among the deans

that although this is a nervous age it is a healthful, clean one. Jazz music came in for some criticism, but the criticism was launched at the orchestras which render it rather than the composer who writes it.

Knee skirts and the toddle dance were pronounced healthy and calculated to banish prudery, and the deans decided that hereafter college dances in the State will be unchaperoned, and that self-reliance will be preached morning, noon and night at the girls who come to learn.

"It is a very nervous generation with which we have to deal, but it is a healthy one and we are all optimistic about it," said Dean Ruby Mason of the University of Illinois, who presided at the conference.

### HUMAN SPIDER FALLS TO DEATH IN BALTIMORE

Andrew Coray, in Feat for Charity, Loses Hold on Wall.

Special Despatch to THE NEW YORK HERALD, BALTIMORE, April 23.—A thousand persons to-night saw Andrew Coray, a human spider, plunge to his death from the top of the new Howard Hotel.

Persons who witnessed the death plunge of a hundred feet say that several times in the ascent the man's fingers were seen to slip. The building was still wet from the rain earlier in the afternoon.

Coray sacrificed life for charity. He was performing the feat for the benefit of the Pentecostal Orphans.

### PRESIDENT DEFIES THE RAIN.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—President Harding refused to permit his regular game of golf to be called off to-day by reason of rain and a soggy field. Immediately after returning from attendance at Baptist memorial exercises, he replaced his hat with the regulation golf cap and walked from the White House to the Municipal golf links to find relaxation after a week of work.

### WOMAN IS MADE HONORARY CORPORAL

Mrs. R. T. Lyman Also Publicly Decorated.

Lyman of Boston has been appointed an honorary non-commissioned officer of the division and has been publicly decorated with the chevron and the French fourragere. The young woman, who is a sister of Col. Cortland Parker, commanding the Sixth Field Artillery, is now listed as Corporal Lyman, Company D, Twenty-sixth Infantry.

The decoration was conferred upon Mrs. Lyman by Major-General Sumner, division commander. For several months Mrs. Lyman has been actively engaged in helping division officers raise the \$150,000 fund that is to pay for a handsome memorial shaft in the Arlington National Cemetery.
