

Golf tournament Lenox Club Opens for Atlantic City for Summer Season

J., May 7.—The annual spring golf tournament of the Atlantic City Country Club, which is to be conducted on the Northfield links, will attract a large field of skilled players on May 13, 20 and 21. Golfers already are arriving for early practice and on Monday there will be a supplementary coterie comprising players who participated in the Lenoxwood matches. Entries for the tournament will close at Hall-don Hall on May 15.

Thirty members of the House Rivers and Harbors Committee are in the resort, inspecting the club's harbor conditions. Representative Isaac Bacharach of this city has been importing Congress to amplify the original appropriation of approximately \$190,000 for channel dredging. Thus far only a 12 foot channel has been cut, but leading residents of the resort desire a 20 foot course, saying that with this feature there would be assurance of a steamship line here.
