

State Open Golf Title Winner Will Receive \$200 for One Day's Play.

The wisdom of the action taken at the annual meeting of the New Jersey State Golf Association, which was held to raise the annual dues by way of replenishing the coffers of the treasurer so that the organization would be enabled to hold an open championship this year, was shown by the result.

Prizes less than \$200 is to be awarded to the man who first is hailed as the open champion of New Jersey. The runner-up will receive \$100; the third man, \$50; the fourth, \$70; the fifth, \$40; the sixth, \$40; the eighth, \$30; the ninth, \$25, and tenth, \$20.
