

CRICKET SEASON IS OPEN IN NEW YORK

MODERN ATLANTAS MAKE NEW RECORDS

Oaksmere Girls Perform Wonders in Interscholastic Track and Field Meet.

MISS KREMER JUMPS 7 FT. 5

Miss Batson, Miss Metzger and Miss Mead Win Honors for Their Schools.

Girl athletes proved what they can do in the breaking records yesterday at the interscholastic track and field meet held at Oaksmere, the Merrifield School, at Mamaroneck.

Trainers anticipated establishing one or two new records with the new girls, they said, but afterward frankly declared that their most sanguine hopes were exceeded.

Florida Batson, a young Southern girl, dark eyes and with wavy dark hair held by a blue ribbon, which is Rosemary's color, stepped out on the track with the air of a trained runner.

Her classmates knew what she would do, but it surprised even the judges when in the first heat of the 60 yard hurdle event she clipped one-fifth of a second from the record.

Miss Helen Kremer of Kansas City was another Oaksmere girl to bring honor to her school by winning the standing broad jump with a leap of feet 4 inches.

A Real Champion. Miss Kremer is the athletic type, unusually tall, with bobbed black hair and suggesting the nervous, high tensioned race horse in her movements on the field.

Miss Rosebaum, the third Oaksmere girl to win the laurel, threw the basketball nearly five feet beyond the record throw, established by herself.

And the fourth girl wearing the green and white athletic costume of Oaksmere to win still greater honors was Miss Louise Metzger of Indianapolis, a freshman.

Up to within an hour before the meet was scheduled to start the clouds threatened sun and rain, threatening and when the skies did clear it was the happiest lot of girls ever seen that ran out upon the Oaksmere track.

There will be almost as large a fleet racing out of Marblehead headquarters for yachtsmen Down East as there will be on the Sound.

The Pequot Yacht Club, successor to the Black Rock and Bridgeport clubs, will have two classes that will race at Southport, Conn. They are four 18 foot knockabouts built by Herreshoff and built by Nevins from designs by Gardner.

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All these races will be over the inside club courses finishing off the club house. Capt. T. N. 700 YACHTS READY FOR SUMMER RACING

Regattas Planned by Scores of Clubs From Maine to Delaware.

A complete list of the yachts that will race on the Sound this summer, beginning with the Harlem Yacht Club regatta on Memorial Day, has been prepared by Frank Bowne Jones, vice-president of the Long Island Sound Yacht Racing Association.

The list, according to reports received up to yesterday, is 260, an increase over last year of approximately 25 per cent, and by far the largest number of boats in commission for racing since before the war.

Provision will be made for these yachts in all the open regattas. In addition to the regattas, there will be one-day classes which will race among themselves in home waters.
