CITY LOSES IN FIRST TRANSIT TEST FIGHT

Justice McAvoy Refuses to Restrain New Commission From Taking Office.

BATTLE WILL CONTINUE

Corporation Counsel Declares Law's Constitutionality Is Not Determined.

HE TELEPHONES JOHNSON

Question of Appeal Held Up Until O'Brien Obtains Views of Senator.

Justice John V. McAvoy of the Supreme Court handed down yesterday a decision refusing to restrain, upon petition of the city, the new Transit Commission from taking office, succeeding the former Transit Construction and Public Service Commissions and from functioning under the Knight-Adler law.

After he talked with Senator Hiram W. Johnson, the city's special counsel, in Washington by long distance telephone Mr. O'Brien said he would have to consult the Senator in person within the next few days before he decided whether the city would appeal or drop the case.

INTERRUPTED ENDING LIFE, SENDS THIRD SHOT TO BRAIN

Cavanaugh.

ICE CREAM MAN SLAIN; PARTNER IS ARRESTED

Lagumina Shot When Walking in 107th Street.

Two men stepped out of a hallway at 208 East 107th street yesterday afternoon and fired four shots at a man who was passing. Two bullets went into the man's left breast, one in his back, and the fourth tore through his left arm.

Patrolman Fagan, breaking through the crowd, found the man dead was Joseph Lagumina, 31, proprietor of the Interborough Ice Cream Company, 233 East Tenth street.

SECRET POLICE QUIZ PROVOKES A CLASH

Meyer and O'Brien Disagree Regarding Former's Powers to Take Testimony.

Senator Schuyler M. Meyer, chairman of the Legislative City Investigating Committee, refused yesterday to be drawn into a court action on the challenge of Corporation Counsel O'Brien that the committee could not impound books or records of the city, but must return them every night.

The issue was raised when the Corporation Counsel for the second time formally refused to permit Deputy Police Commissioner William A. Leach or Grant Crabtree, Deputy Clerk of the Police Department, to testify before Chairman Meyer, sitting as a committee of one, or to permit the records that had been subpoenaed to remain over night at the committee headquarters, 38 Park row.

SEIZE \$30,000 DRUGS TRAILED FROM LINER

Detectives Also Arrest Man in Flat After Scuffle With Pistol.

A week ago the anti-narcotic squad in Police Headquarters received word that an Italian steamship was on its way here bearing, among other things, a considerable quantity of cocaine and morphine to be smuggled into New York.

On Saturday the steamship arrived and Detectives Moffett, Spotts and Cotter observed several persons holding furtive conversations with a man who turned out to be Antonio Conditto, 587 West Fifty-seventh street.

They delayed calling on Conditto until yesterday, when they pushed past him as he opened the door at their knock. On a table in the dining room of the man's flat they found a packet which they report contained morphine. When asked to reveal the rest of the stuff Conditto indicated a trunk. Spotts bent over the trunk and Conditto, the detective said, snatched a revolver from an army overcoat hanging on the wall.

Conditto was knocked down and handcuffed. In the ensuing scuffle the trunk and a package of Christmas dresses and morphine they say would have fetched nearly \$30,000 if peddled on the street. Likewise they found another revolver and a package of Christmas dresses and morphine. The cards bore the embossed picture of a woman's shoe. The toe of the shoe was moveable and beneath the toe there was just room enough for a deck of cocaine, heroin or morphine.

Conditto was taken to Police Headquarters charged with violating both the Sullivan and the anti-narcotic laws. He will be arraigned in the West Side Court to-day.

JURY AWARDS \$25,000.

A verdict for \$25,000 was returned against the New York Telephone Company in favor of Mrs. Margaret Rimmer and her niece, Miss Mary Rice, of 1821 Southern Boulevard, The Bronx, by a jury yesterday in Bronx County Supreme Court.

Alfred Rimmer, husband of Mrs. Rimmer, stumbled over a cable of the telephone company near a building which was being wrecked at 22 Bowery and fell, receiving injuries which caused his death. Harry Berlin, a contractor, who employed Rimmer, said that he had made several requests to the telephone company to have the cable removed because it hampered the workmen.

OWN HARDING PORTRAIT.

The Hungarian Republican Club of New York has decided to hang its own portrait of President Harding in its club house, 155 West 119th street. It has selected Marcus A. Raslo, a New York portrait painter, to make the picture and arrangements have been completed to have the President sit several times for Mr. Raslo, who left for Washington yesterday.
