The ceremony, which was performed by the Rev. John Lovejoy Elliott of the Society of Ethical Culture, was attended only by the bride's mother, Mrs. Augusta O. Matsner of 125 East Twenty-fourth street, her two brothers-in-law and sisters, Mr. and Mrs. James Lawrence Breese, parents of the bridegroom, and the bridegroom's sister, Mrs. Lawrence Keckler Miller.

The bride is a native of Virginia and her father, Mr. Sydney S. Breese, is a member of the old and well-known New York family. He is a graduate of the late Bishop Henry Codman Potter. Following his graduation from Harvard in 1905 he devoted himself to mechanical pursuits.

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EARL OF SHREWSBURY'S DEATH ANNOUNCED

Sportsman, Polo Player and Drove Own Coaches.

Special Cable to THE NEW YORK HERALD, London, May 18. The death of the Earl of Shrewsbury, one of the most democratic of peers, was announced here today. He was the first man to introduce rubber-tired hansom cabs in London, Paris, Brussels and Milan, and for years owned and hired out a fleet of such cabs, unwearying not being ashamed of this incursion into business as the grand custom among the British aristocracy, but displayed his family coronet on the highest and most prominent brass rail on his cabs.

When the outbreak captured his fancy in 1903 he became so enthusiastic that he built a factory for the manufacture of motor cars and turned out 500 of them the first year his plant was in operation.

The Earl of Shrewsbury inherited his title and a large fortune when he was 17 years old. He married at the age of 22 Mrs. Miller Mundy, the divorced wife of the Earl, causing a great sensation in 1881. The Earl was a great sportsman. He owned a stable of racing horses, was a member of the Turf Club, and was an expert polo player. His wife, Viscountess, who was born in 1914, succeeded him.

The funeral of Francis Finton Greene, former Police Commissioner, and at one time commander of the Seventy-first Regiment, will be held at the funeral home in Grace Church, Broadway and Tenth street, attended by military and civic officials.
