Napoleon's History Told in Extensive Display of Medals

American Numismatic Society Has Notable Exhibition Covering Many Years.

Napoleon's history is graphically outlined in a comprehensive exhibition of medals in the museum of the American Numismatic Society, Broadway and 156th street. There are the early crude lead medals issued for popular distribution to commemorate the Three Estates and the storming of the Bastille on July 14, 1789; medals on the death of Louis XVI. in 1793, others on events during the Reign of Terror, and portrait medals of leading men at that time.

Medals of a better character were struck about 1796. These depicted events in the Italian campaign, and it was at this time that the first medallion portrait of Napoleon Bonaparte appeared. Then followed the portrayal of Napoleon's campaign in Egypt, his return to France and his election as First Consul.

From this time on the medals become more numerous, Napoleon never losing an opportunity to commemorate an event in medallion form—his coronation as Emperor in 1804, new laws, newly established institutions as well as long lists of battles are all set forth as historical records in enduring metal.

Medals recording changes in European politics, portraying various members of his family, stirring events of the first fifteen years of the nineteenth century, the domestic affairs of the Emperor, his marriage with Marie Louise, and the birth of the King of Rome are exhibited and are of great interest. Napoleon's death, just one hundred years ago, is placed in his memory and the belated return of his remains to France in 1840 bring the medallion series to a close.

The coinage of France from the time of Louis XVI. through the republic and the period of Napoleon and the coins of the various republics formed in Italy and the many small kingdoms set up here and there in Europe by the Emperor show graphically and vividly the power and extent of the empire in this one man. The exhibition has been arranged by Howland Wood, the curator.

FILM COUNTRY PLACES IN AID OF CHARITIES

Scenes for 'Peter Ibbetson' to Be Taken on Long Island.

To-morrow the heads of the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation and a large cast of film players, including Miss Elsie Ferguson, will join Mrs. Meredith Hare at her country place in Huntington, L. I., and go from there to a beautiful place in the neighborhood where some scenes for the forthcoming picture of "Peter Ibbetson" will be filmed.

The site has been selected by the film corporation as best suggesting a setting for an episode in the early French career of Peter Ibbetson. From that place the movie players will go to Rosemary, the country place of Mr. Roland Conklin, in Huntington, for additional outdoor and interior scenes.

Mrs. Hare is one of the organizers of the Film Service Mutual Benefit Bureau and associated with her are Mrs. William G. McAdoo, Miss Mabel Choate, Miss Anne Morgan and Miss Elizabeth Bishop Perkins. The income from the fees obtained from the film houses will be divided between the New York Maternity Centre Association and the American Committee for Devastated France. Several such contracts with movie houses have been made.



Lafayette Guild Working for New Nurses' Home.

In the morning Mme. Curie dedicated the new low temperature laboratory of the Bureau of Mines at exercises held in the Interior Department.


Son Born to Mrs. Louis N. Grant.
