COUNTESS DI FRASSO DIVORCED; ENGAGED TO ITALIAN DIPLOMAT

Former Miss Wilde to Be Bride of Piero Alfredo Quazzone.

Announcement was made yesterday of the engagement of the former Countess Carlo Dentice di Frasso to Mr. Piero Alfredo Quazzone, first secretary of the Italian Embassy in Tokio. The engagement furnishes the first authentic news that the marriage of Count and Countess Dentice di Frasso had been dissolved. The former Countess has assumed the name of Mrs. Georgine Wilde, the latter being her maiden name.

Mrs. Wilde is a daughter of the late George M. Wilde of St. Louis, a member of the Stock Exchange, who died when she was quite young. His widow became Mrs. Henry Siegel, who, after gaining her divorce, resumed the name of her first husband, Mrs. Georgine Wilde who was educated in Europe and after her marriage was prominent in European circles. She speaks fluently French, Italian, Spanish, German and has acquired the Russian language. Her marriage to Mr. Quazzone will take place here shortly.

Mrs. Wilde's future husband was with the Italian Embassy in Petrograd during the first years of the revolution in Russia and later was in the Italian Embassy in Paris during the Peace Conference. He has been in the diplomatic service for eight years.

His father, Mr. Giuseppe Quazzone, who went to the Argentine Republic years ago, is one of the wealthiest men in Italy and he is called the Wheat and Cattle King of the Argentine. 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Henry A.C. Taylor, Dr. Vesnitch Dies; Jugoslav Diplomat

Former Premier and Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Paris, May 28.—Dr. Milenko R. Vesnitch, former Yugoslav Premier and Minister of Foreign Affairs, and lately Yugoslav Minister of Finance, died here today. Dr. Vesnitch in 1906 married Mrs. Blanche Ullman of New York. Dr. Vesnitch, who was one of the Balkan peace conference which met in the peace treaty of Versailles, had a long career as diplomat and statesman. His first important post in a diplomatic capacity was that of Serbian Minister in Rome. In July, 1904, he was sent to Paris as Serbian Minister to France, and in 1912 was named as a member of the Balkan peace conference which met in London after the first Balkan war.

Early in the European war Dr. Vesnitch entered the Serbian Cabinet, serving as Minister of Finance, and later represented Serbia at various allied conferences in Paris and elsewhere. In 1917 he headed the Serbian mission to the United States, delivering addresses while in that country in the Senate and House of Representatives in Washington, and after the armistice was named Yugoslav delegate to the peace conference in Paris.

He was on terms of intimacy with President Wilson during the peace conference, and when Mr. Wilson was elected chairman of the conference he drafted the League of Nations covenant as selected Dr. Vesnitch as one of the members of the commission. The Serbian member took an important part in the drafting of the covenant, and in the critical phases he was designated with Lord Robert Cecil and Premier Venizelos to settle some of the difficulties which had threatened to insure its adoption.

Dr. Vesnitch took the lead in supporting the Yugoslav claims, and it was largely through his influence and that of Mr. Trumbitch, Minister of Finance in the Senate and House of Representatives, that the issue along the lines of Jugoslavia's contentions. It was because of his firm and bolding attitude on this subject that Dr. Vesnitch became Minister of Foreign Affairs of Jugoslavia.

Dr. Vesnitch was born in 1854, in the town of Zlatibor, in the Kingdom of Serbia. He was educated in the University of Belgrade, and was a member of the board of managers of the Delovna Lackawanna and Western Railroad.
