CORNELL VARSITY DUNDERS HARVARD

Wins by Four Lengths on Charles, but Crimson Freshmen Lead.

BOSTON, Mass., May 28.—Cornell defeated Harvard in the varsity race on the Charles late this afternoon by four lengths, but the Crimson freshmen, in a splendidly contested race against the Cornell yearlings, won by three-quarters of a length. The Cornell varsity time was 9:45, which was three seconds slower than that which was turned in by the Cambridge freshman eight over the one and seven-eighths mile course.

Close at the Start

The eight surely seemed evenly matched as they began their real racing, and for more than half a mile the Cornell and Harvard crews kept together, but neither showed an advantage of more than three or four feet. Both also were rowing with reserve. About three-quarters of a mile from the start Cornell picked up with a new fire and began to go ahead steadily.

Harvard shot away and for a time the race was one of a half mile. Cornell was two and a half miles ahead and was rowing in perfect union. HIGH SPEED POLO ON HURLINGHAM FIELD

Americans Score Over British 10 to 6—Hopping to Replace Hitchcock.

Special Cable to THE NEW YORK HERALD. LONDON, May 28.—While the Americans were winning a cracking victory, 10 to 6, over the Hurlingham team at Hurlingham this afternoon the British team suffered its first defeat at the hands of the Hurlingham team.

There has been an important change in the American team. It is now practically settled that Hopping will replace Hitchcock at No. 2 after his demonstration of ability at a slashing attack this afternoon. Hitchcock has been badly off his game, but in his four appearances and friends attribute this to the constant nagging to which he has been subjected from other and older players on his own side on the field.

Hitchcock played two with Hurlingham this afternoon, while Stoddard played one, the other being Lord Dalmeny and Capt. Hunter. This is a very strong side. There is little chance around the prize of a mount in the international matches goes to the one showing the best form. Hitchcock repeated his feat to-day, but he was outplayed by the Hurlingham team. The result was high speed polo, frequently of the sort that makes a large gallery rise to its feet to cheer. It even brought a yell or two from Admiral William S. The royalty was little less enthusiastic than the commons.

The first chucker opened vigorously with the Americans scoring four and Hurlingham two goals. All six came in rapid succession. After a six game interval of riding and striking, Hopping opened the score for the club. Hopping scored for the Americans. Hopping repeated his feat with another and then Rumsey, who was giving aid and comfort to the Americans, a commanding lead—six goals in seven minutes.

The third chucker again provided what veterans are giving aid and comfort to this season. Webb at three scored the right hand goals, nipped one from the corner, and two minutes later, jumping through the scrimmage, scored a goal. In the fifth game a real flash of the old Millburn brilliance, when the superbly mounted American captain from near the middle dribbled the ball almost across the field, swung it forward, followed it like a flash and scored clean. But easily the feature of the entire game was Hopping's work. He is probably the best horseman among the chackers and Rumsey again gave the outside Dalmeny for the ball and scored five of the winners' goals.
