

BIG LIBERAL COLONY, BOUCK WHITE'S PLAN

Socialists From New York
Were to Join Agitator in
Mountain Retreat.

DENIES HE IS A BOMBER

Marlboro People Refuse a
Hearing, Though He Says
He Is Misunderstood.

POUGHKEEPSIE, May 31.—Ill at ease because he knows the people of Marlboro, in Ulster county, consider him an undesirable, Bouck White, pastor of the defunct Church of the Social Revolution, announced to-day that he would renew his efforts to explain his social, economic and political views to the residents of the town.

White made an uneventful trip of three miles to the village to-day. Rumors of what may possibly happen have been carried to him, but he moved about the town without being molested.

"I do not feel unsafe, but I am uncomfortable," he said. "I know how bitter the people feel against me, and I am sure that this bitterness will disappear if I get an opportunity to state my side. My brand of Socialism is unintelligible to them. They picture me as a bomb throwing radical, which I am not. If, after I explain, the people still felt unkindly toward me I will move away."

White would like to expound his views in the First Presbyterian Church, but James Foster Wygant, president of the First National Bank of Marlboro and a deacon of the church, said that the agitator would not get the opportunity to speak. In fact, indications are that Mr. White will have to hire a hall; but there is no hall in Marlboro.

Besides, feeling against him a still at a high pitch, and some say they would be pleased if the agitator moved away. During the day a state trooper from White Plains visited White's place, but merely to verify the signature of a check White had sent to the Secretary of State in payment for his automobile license.

White admitted after it had been told by Mrs. Andree Emille Simon White, his young French wife, who is suing for an annulment, that his object in moving to Ulster county, and particularly to a desolate spot in the Shawangunk Hills, was to found a colony of liberals.

Mrs. White says the agitator told her she was to be the "Queen of the Colony," also the tutor in French.

People in Marlboro had heard of the proposed colony. This added fuel to the feeling against him and then came the alleged mistreatment of his young wife. Now the feeling seems to be that Marlboro will not be the same again until Bouck White's name has been wiped off its tax rolls.

"He wanted me to be the centre of a radical group up there," Mrs. White said, pointing up the hill to her husband's shack.

It was his idea to turn the place into a radical colony and eventually to bring up many of his radical friends from New York. He would talk for three hours at a time about his radical ideas, pacing up and down the floor as he did so.

It was my idea when I married White to have a family, but the only family he wanted was books. He said that books would be our children; that we would write one together and that it would be our child. He held that our marriage could be happiest by trying to change the world. His idea of marriage was a spiritual union, with himself as the professor and with me as the scholar.

PAPER MEN ASK TROOPS TO QUELL STRIKERS

Second Riot in 24 Hours at
Green Bay, Wis.

MANITOWIC, Wis., May 31.—Gov. John J. Blaine has been asked to send troops to Green Bay to quell labor troubles there. The Governor said he would decide later whether troops will be sent.

The second strike riot within twenty-four hours, occurred at Green Bay Tuesday morning when strikers at the Northern Paper Mills forcibly prevented strikebreakers hired by the company from going to work.

The disturbance followed a cutting affray Monday night, as the outgrowth of a clash between pickets and strikebreakers.

The request for troops was made after Sheriff Nicholas Ryan of Brown county and a force of armed deputies were overpowered at the gates of the Northern Paper Company mill Thursday morning.

MOUNTED POLICEMAN HURT.

An automobile frightened the horse of Sergeant James L. McNulty of Traffic A at West and Hubert streets yesterday afternoon. The animal reared and McNulty was thrown off heavily, dislocating his right hip and spraining his back. He was taken home.

SUSPECTS IN HOLDUP MURDER FIGHT HARD

Men Demand Separate Trials
at Dedham, Mass.

Dedham, Mass., May 31.—Determination by the defence to fight hard the prosecution of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, charged with the murder of Frederick A. Parmenter and Alessandro Berardelli at South Braintree a year ago, marked the opening of their joint trial here to-day. Parmenter was robbed of a shoe factory payroll of \$16,000.

When District Attorney Katzman moved that a jury be impanelled counsel for the defence petitioned for a demurrer, for separate trials and for a bill of particulars. The court took the motions under advisement.

Of eighty talesmen drawn from a panel of 500 only two were agreed upon, a real estate agent and a grocer.

WARRANT FOR BODE AS HOBOKEN SLAYER

Police Say Mystery of Rueckert's
Murder Is Sure to
Be Cleared Now.

Henry Bode of 57 Paterson avenue, Hoboken, also known as Harry Berthe and as Edward Boscho, was taken to Hoboken from Atlantic City last night and locked up on a warrant charging him with the murder of Frederick Rueckert, president of the United States White Metal Company, in Rueckert's apartment, at 1127 Washington street, Hoboken, on May 9, 1920. The detectives also brought with them William Foster of 506 West 135th street, and in addition to the murder charge against Bode the two were charged with stealing a suit of clothes from a Hoboken store on May 8, 1920.

The Bode warrant is based on his identification by William R. Alexander, a prominent member of the Hoboken lodge of Elks, as the man Alexander had seen buying a revolver a few days before the murder in the pawnshop of a man named Cohen in 229 Washington street, Hoboken. This revolver was found lying alongside Rueckert's body, the police say. Alexander is positive Bode is the man he saw buying the weapon because his attention was attracted by the careless manner in which the purchaser handled the gun.

Bode and Foster were arrested by the police of Atlantic City two weeks ago after they had been seen acting in a suspicious manner. At that time they were accompanied by another man and three women, but these were discharged when arraigned in a police court. Bode and Foster, however, were convicted of disorderly conduct and sent to the county jail at Mays Landing, where they were serving their terms when Hoboken detectives served the warrant on Bode yesterday.

Inspector D. J. Kelly, Capt. Thomas Garock and Detective Sergeant William Christie of Hoboken, who went to Atlantic City with Alexander and served the warrant, said that they believed the mystery of Rueckert's death had been solved. They had definitely ascertained some time ago, they said, that robbery was the motive for the crime and not a financial dispute resulting from transfers of alien enemy property during the war. The latter theory was first advanced by Bode, the Hoboken detectives say, in a rope burglar, one who gets into apartments by tying a rope to a chimney and sliding down it to a window. He is a former seaman, they said.

The murder of Rueckert more than a year ago received additional interest because two young women, Miss Elsie Vorrath of 1022 Garden avenue, Hoboken, and Miss Mae Trask, who would never tell where she lived, appeared and claimed to be fiancées of the dead man. The engagement of Rueckert and Miss Vorrath had been announced, but none of the dead man's friends would admit that they had ever heard of Miss Trask, who vanished before the funeral and has not since been heard of.


STILL HOPE FOR SAFETY OF ESPERANTO'S CREW

HALIFAX, May 31.—Hope still is held out that the crew of the Gloucester fishing schooner Esperanto, which sank off Sable Island Sunday night, is aboard the schooner Elsie II. Fishermen are eagerly awaiting reports of the Elsie, believing that vessel picked up the crew while on the way to the fishing grounds.

The arrival of the schooner Mildred Robertson, also a fishing vessel, caused excitement when it was at first believed she was the Elsie. The crew had not seen the Elsie and did not know of the wreck of the fishing fleet champion.
