**CABINET CRISIS NOW AVOIDED IN GERMANY**

Failure to Define Reparations Plan Likely to Delay Chancellor's Fall.

**NO GENERAL ELECTION**

Concise Programme of Taxation Awaits End of Summer Vacation.

**SCANT FAVOR TO SPEECH**

Independent Socialists Decide to Support Dr. Wirth, Assuring Majority.

Chancellor Wirth's Cabinet will probably succeed in deferring the presentation of a concise programme to the Reichstag until after the summer vacation period, and thereby will save the calling of a general election at this time. The Chancellor's speech in the Reichstag yesterday was either wholeheartedly condemned by his enemies or damned with faint praise by his followers to-day.

His weakness, however, was acknowledged to be partly due to the inability of the Cabinet to reach a decision regarding the best way of handling a reorganization of German industry and of raising the large sums needed for the payment of reparations to the Allies. His vagueness on these points served to enable him to remain in power and gave him time to consult with business leaders and members of his Ministry before deciding what form new industrial Germany will take.

His support to-day proves sufficient to enable him to tide over the vacation period, thanks to the faith of the Independent Socialists, who to-day decided to lend their support to the rather loosely phrased vote of confidence in the Government. Chancellor Wirth, although a Clerical in politics, is distinguished from the Socialists by little more than this formal fact, and the majority in the Reichstag now comes more from the Socialist than from the non-Socialist parties.

While the Chancellor in his speech merely reviewed the broader lines of the taxation scheme whereby the Government hopes to raise the money necessary to meet the reparation payments and eliminate the budget deficit, his speech was interrupted frequently by a running fire of interjections and booing from both the Right and the Extreme Left. One Communist shouted "Amnesty!" repeatedly while the Chancellor spoke of the necessity for meeting the reparation payments, while the Conservatives jeered at this part of the speech and groined when he spoke of the necessity of agrarian reform. The Chancellor's reference to the necessity of disbanding the Bavarian Organisation (civilian guards) and other defence organizations excited their angry resentment.

That part of the Chancellor's speech which was best received was when he declared that the enforcing and collecting of the existing tax measures was more important than the enactment of new tax legislation and that "the revo-

He outlined briefly a programme for the development of agriculture, waterways, transportation and home colonization, and urged the restriction of imports and the increase of exports, which, he asserted, was the only way in which Germany could meet her reparation obligations.

BERLIN, June 2.—The bulk of Berlin newspaper comment on Chancellor Wirth's speech admits that the new Government for the present can do no more than assert its intention loyally to carry out the terms of the allied ultimatum and that the Government must be given the opportunity to demonstrate its ability to marshal the nation's resources for fulfillment of its obligations to the Entente.

While the organs of the coalition parties praise the candor, determination and good will reflected in the Chancellor's speech, the Tagblatt expresses curiosity as to whether the parties will stand by him in the long run, declaring that decisive accomplishments by the new Government are still to come forth. The Nationalist newspapers, which violently opposed acceptance of the ultimatum, say they find the speech a mixture of noncommittal phrases and commonplace, which, when summed up, mean "we sign, you pay."

**FRANCE NOT SEEKING ANNEXATION, HE SAYS**

Barthou Pays Tribute to U. S. at Luncheon.

Barthou, in toasting the King of England, the King of Belgium and President Harding at a lunch given in his honor to-day, referred to the great honor accorded him in being escorted by American troops on his arrival in the Rhineland.

M. Barthou recalled his agreeable visit to the United States and declared in the name of his Government that France had no thought of annexation or conquest.

**BYNG FOR CANADA'S CHIEF.**

MONTREAL, June 2.—Lord Byng of Vimy has been offered the Governor-Generalship of Canada, to succeed the Duke of Devonshire, according to the Gazette to-day. The paper says that contingent upon Lord Byng's acceptance an official announcement of his appointment may be expected within a few days.

**JAPAN TO POSTPONE SIBERIA EVACUATION**

Far Eastern Republic Minister Says Stability Depends on Help of U. S.

TOKYO, June 2.—A communication issued to-day by the Japanese War Department, after pointing out that the leaders of the former Government at Vladivostok have been conducted in the direction of China, asserts that it is the intention of Japan to adhere to her policy of non-interference in Russian internal politics.

The Yonaka says Japan will indefinitely postpone her evacuation of Siberia on account of the political developments there.

According to the Nishi Nishi Herald correspondent, M. Iyoff, Finance Minister in the Far Eastern Republic, told J. F. Abbott, United States commercial attaché, who is now at Chita, that the establishment of a stable government in the Far East would be impossible without the assistance of the United States and recognition by Japan and China. As a result of the overthrow of the Vladivostok administration, the Chita Government has placed the Amur railroad under military control and has issued an order for mobilization of its forces, including the Trans-Baikal Cossacks.

The Russian colony here regards the political overturn at Vladivostok as a significant anti-Bolshevik movement. Iyoff is expressed that the arrival of Semenov, the Cossack anti-Bolshevik leader, who has announced his intention of proceeding to Vladivostok, will create dissensions among the anti-Soviet elements. M. Merkuloff, it is learned, has telegraphed Semenov, asking him to keep away.

**FRENCH FURIOUS AT HIGHER SALES TAX**

Business Men Cry for Its Repeal or Extension to Farmer Classes.

A bill just presented in the Chamber of Deputies virtually doubling the present tax on sales to make up for the deficit between receipt to date and what was expected of the tax is arousing furious opposition on the part of French business organizations, who are demanding that either the tax be repealed or that it be extended to agriculturalists if it is maintained in force. A canvass of Paris business syndicates, according to M. Maus, president of the central business organizations, shows they are unanimous that the doubling of the tax is dangerous and unjust.

"If the proposal is adopted the result will be an inevitable increase in the cost of living, for the consumer pays the tax," M. Maus said. No attempt has been made to extend the tax to agriculture, because as a rule the farmers do not keep books and the Government believes it almost impossible to collect the tax from them. However, business organizations are now demanding that if the proposed tax is adopted, the farmers of France will be compelled to keep sales books, and that the tax be collected from them by correspondence, with severe penalties meted out to tax dodgers. The sale tax is likely to be the cause of a lively debate in the Chamber of Deputies, with the agricultural interests seeking to escape it by any way possible.
