

CHEW SENT BEHIND LINES, OFFICER SAYS

Accused Captain Incapable of Commanding Troops, Testimony of Ex-Lieutenant.

Capt. Beverly Grayson Chew, on trial by court-martial at Governors Island, accused of forgery and other offenses, was made a town major, stationed far behind the lines, because he was not capable of commanding troops in action, according to testimony given yesterday by another officer of his former regiment.

The witness, Franklin A. Harwood of 184 Clinton street, Brooklyn, formerly a Lieutenant in E company, Sixteenth Infantry, was called by the prosecution in an effort to prove that Capt. Chew had not seen active service and therefore could not have been shell shocked, as the defence contends. Harwood told of Chew's assignment behind the lines, but under cross-examination by William Lahey, counsel for Chew, admitted that he didn't know all Chew's assignments in France.

Lieut. Harwood also testified that after the war he had seen Chew at the Walter Reed military hospital, Washington, but the accused officer apparently was having a good time around the city.

David Carvalho, a handwriting expert, testified that the handwriting of the Captain's wife was the same as that on a check signed "Marjorie B. Spalding" passed on a millinery concern here last October. The defence is endeavoring

to show that this woman was not Mrs. Chew but some other woman under whose influence, in his uncertain mental condition, he had fallen.

Unexpectedly the prosecution yesterday called Capt. Herbert Rose, United States Marine Corps, who was to have been a witness for the defence. Capt. Rose said that while living in Brooklyn last August with Capt. and Mrs. Chew the accused officer showed indications of being sub-normal. He also testified he had known Mrs. Chew a year before her marriage to the Captain, and that he introduced her to Capt. Chew in Washington in 1916. They were married a year later and Capt. Rose acted as best man.

The prosecution will call two witnesses to-day and then rest.

GERMAN SUBMARINE IS SUNK BY U. S. WARSHIPS

Former Sea Terror Shelled in Lake Michigan.

CHICAGO, June 7.—Midway between Chicago and Milwaukee on Lake Michigan another provision of the Treaty of Versailles was fulfilled to-day when the UC-97, a German submarine which had sent seven allied merchantmen to the bottom, was riddled with shells from the U. S. S. Wilmette and Hawk and sunk.

A thin film of oil on the surface was all that remained to tell the tale as the submarine poked its nose into the bottom of the lake in search of a final resting place.

The submarine, a war prize, which has been exhibited in Chicago for two years, was ordered destroyed, in accordance with the terms of the peace treaty.



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
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
