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SCREEN SHOWBOYS Business Man Back From Abroad Says Film Makers in Europe Are Beginning to Show Signs of Life—Sees No Danger of Flood From Germany.

By FRANK VRELAND. DAVID P. HOWELLS, one of the leading exporters and importers in this country, has just returned from a two months' survey of motion picture conditions in Europe and finds the film business there is beginning to show signs of life—a fact which Los Angeles has already suspected.

Mr. Howells, whose company has branches in all the large Continental capitals and who keeps closely in touch with foreign trade conditions, estimated conservatively that 2,000 more pictures will be made in Europe this year than last year.

However, he did not anticipate that the State Constabulary or any Government agency would be expected to stop this deluge, pointing out that among 300 pictures recently produced in Germany only four had so far been deemed worthy of quickening the American pulse.

In Berlin and other parts of Germany consecrated to the films he said there were about a score of companies turning out pictures, but with less enthusiasm with which they turned their camera lenses on the world.

Mr. Howells has brought back from Germany the latest authentic, close range information as to the number of American pictures which that country is now producing, and according to his survey the sum total of enjoyment which Germany is having on the American plan is nil.
