BRITISH MINISTER DEMANDS APOLOGY; MAY QUIT POLAND Charges President of Iwanicki Court-Martial With Responsibility for Reports That England Bought Mobilization Plans Sold to Foreign Powers.

WARSAW, June 12.—The British Minister to Poland, Sir Wilfrid Grenfell Max-Muller, today announced his intention of withdrawing from his post unless an apology was forthcoming immediately from the president of the court-martial which heard the case of the Polish Lieutenant, Henry K. Iwanicki, who recently was convicted of stealing the Polish army mobilization plans and disposing of them to agents of a foreign power. (Lieut. Iwanicki was executed on June 4.)

ROTARIANS SEE WAR IN TRADE RIVALRY Edinburgh Resolution Aims to Cement Friendship Among Nations.

With businesslike directness a resolution proposed by the Halifax Club says what most regular diplomats think but do not say—that commercial rivalry may lead to a war more terrible than the previous one. The Rotarians, whose main activity is bringing together in a friendly fashion the keener local business rivals, now propose to do the same thing with international rivals.

Disturbances also occurred in the Keshior road, Falls division, the chief storm centre of the riots last July, and here the police fired on Sinn Fein snipers. An unidentified man was shot dead. The question is being widely raised as to whether the killings here over this week end will interfere with the visit of King George to participate in the state opening of the Ulster Parliament on June 22.

Text of Resolution. The international amity resolution reads: 'Whereas, The continued development of business and industry constantly is widening the circle of marketing and exchange, making the people of the whole world interdependent, and Whereas, Most of the great nations are just emerging from a long continued biological struggle, with acute bitterness and hatred engendered by strife, and Whereas, The competition among the nations of the world for trade outside their own boundaries in the present and future promises the active prosecution of a commercial war as keen and merciless and more insidious than a struggle in arms, and Whereas, Such widespread contests, it appears, contain the seeds of contention which surely will lead to further national embroilments in a more terrible and more disastrous war than the one recently terminated, and Whereas, The wonderful development of means of transportation and communication have in verity made the whole world a great neighborhood, and Whereas, The most insistent commandment of all great religions for men in their human relations is for each to love his neighbor as himself, he it is 'Resolved, that the most evident ne-

cessities of the present time are a better understanding and more good will among the peoples and nations of the whole world; and be it further 'Resolved by the International Association of Rotary Clubs (which was founded on the principles of human cooperation for human service) at its twelfth annual convention, that the association will actively strive to promote a more complete friendship and understanding among all peoples of the earth; and be it further 'Resolved that the association will appoint a committee on international amity which will actively formulate and promound and promote through the various Rotary clubs as some part of the regular policy and programme of this association, ways and means of securing a greater understanding and good will among all peoples.'

U. S. ALLIED WARSHIPS AVOID CONSTANTINE Leave Smyrna Harbor Rather Than Salute King of Greece on His Arrival.

By the Associated Press. SMYRNA, June 12.—King Constantine arrived here this afternoon and was greeted enthusiastically, although the ardor of the crowds was not as great as at Athens. The allied warships had left the harbor in order to avoid saluting the King. An official welcome was extended by Gov.-Gen. Steriades, Commander in Chief Papoulas and the Turkish Mayor, the Mayor addressing the King in the Turkish language.

Constantine reviewed the troops and a parade of school children and patriotic societies. Extraordinary precautions were taken to protect him, soldiers and police being stationed on all the balconies and roofs. After the ceremonies the King was taken to a private villa outside the city, where he will remain for a few days before going to the front.

ATHENS, June 12.—King Constantine, before sailing for Smyrna to direct the Greek operations against the Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor, issued this message to the Greek people: 'I go to place myself at the head of my army. Where Hellenism has struggled for centuries, with the aid of the All Highest, victory will crown the efforts of our race, which is advancing irresistibly toward its destiny. Our predominance in those regions, as did formerly that of our forefathers, will insure realization of our highest ideals of liberty, equality and justice. The history of our race guides our arms, and this admirable history of civilization lays on us obligations of which we are profoundly aware; and we further are able to proclaim proudly that we will be fully able to discharge them. The Greek people in its sacred union confers this right on us by its incomparable sacrifices. Trusting in Divine assistance, in the dash of my heroic army and the unconquerable moral force of Hellenic ideals, I go where the accomplishment of these supreme national aspirations calls me.'

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 12.—The Turkish steamer Akdanz penetrated the Greek blockade of the Black Sea and arrived here today from Batum, after having landed Mr. Nathanarov, the Russian Soviet Ambassador to the Turkish Nationalist Government, in Angora, at Samsun. He was accompanied by twenty officers and many women secretaries and had two chests of gold. The British officials here were informed today that eleven prisoners held by the Turkish Nationalists have been released and are on the way to Trebizond.

NO TREATY WITH IRISH, RUSSIAN MISSION SAYS

LONDON, June 12.—The Russian mission in London today declared on behalf of the Soviet Government that the alleged treaty which the British Government asserted on Thursday last had been drawn up for signature by the Russian Government and the 'Republic of Ireland' was a pure invention. No treaty or agreement, either with the Sinn Fein or any other party in Ireland, the mission asserted, was ever made by the Russian Republic or by any of its isolated institutions.

In a 'White Paper' the British Government made public what purported to be the draft of a proposed treaty between the Russian Soviet Government and the 'Republic of Ireland,' comprising fifteen articles, including pledges of 'resources and influence' of the two Governments to promote recognition of the sovereignty of each other by the nations of the world.

BRITISH ACT ALONE IN CLEARING SILESIA Henniker Moves Against Insurgents Without French Sanction.

By the Associated Press. BERLIN, June 12.—The British Gen. Henniker, in command of British troops in Upper Silesia, has assumed the responsibility for clearing the region of insurgents and is operating without official sanction of the French head of the Interallied Commission, Gen. Lynd, but has the cooperation of the Italian forces, according to advices printed in Berlin newspapers. The advices state that the entire area is expected again to be under allied control within ten days.

The killing of an English sergeant by Polish insurgents is not expected to affect in any way the British plans to pacify the country with the least possible bloodshed, and no reprisals will be permitted. It is understood that Gen. Henniker does not contemplate a direct effort at disarmament of the district but merely intends to reestablish allied prestige by dissolution of the organized rebel forces. It is hoped this may be accomplished without the actual use of force, although it is understood that in the event the Poles offer resistance in the industrial districts, particularly in Katowitz, where they are strongest, the British are prepared to quell them with rifles and machine guns.
