

REPARATIONS PARLEY RAISES FRENCH HOPE

Economic Understanding With the Germans Is Now Promised.

Conversations dealing with questions of reparations and restitutions between Louis Loucheur, French Minister for the Liberated Regions, and Dr. Walter Rathenau, German Minister of Reconstruction, continued at Wiesbaden to-day, are attracting great attention in France, as they afford what is perhaps the most hopeful promise yet had of an economic understanding between Germany and her principal creditor under the terms of the London agreement.
