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MASS FOR GEN. GOMEZ IN CATHEDRAL Body Will Be Taken to Havana in Cuban Cruiser.

Mass will be said in St. Patrick's Cathedral to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock for Gen. Jose Miguel Gomez, former President of Cuba, who died Monday in the Hotel Plaza. Following the ceremony there will be a procession under police escort to the Pennsylvania Station, where the body will be placed aboard a train for Key West, accompanied by members of the family and Dr. Ernest Monaghan, who was one of the physicians in attendance on the general. From Key West the body of Gen. Gomez is to be taken on a Cuban cruiser to Havana.

The cathedral service will be attended by immediate relatives, including Gen. Gomez's wife, daughter and son, who were with him at his death, and Maria Manuela, now on route from Cuba. Major-Gen. Robert L. Bulwer, commanding the Second Corps Area, Gov. Frank B. Rowland, who was selected by Secretary Weeks to attend the funeral and instructed to assign a battalion of infantry as escort from the church to the railway and also non-commissioned officers as guard of honor on the journey to Key West. Two destroyers will accompany the Cuban vessel to Havana.

President Harding full of military honors will be paid when the body of former President Gomez is taken to Key West to be placed aboard a Cuban cruiser. President Harding yesterday sent a message of condolence to President Zayas of Cuba on the death of Gen. Gomez. The message said: "I send to you and to the Government and the people of Cuba the expression of my sincere condolences on the national loss sustained by your country through the death of the distinguished and conspicuous citizen of the Republic of Cuba, ex-President Gomez."
