Southampton Has Throng of Sojourners for Holidays

Hospitality of Resort to Be Taxed This Week by Guests for Wedding of Miss Krech and Mr. William S. Cowles, Jr.

SOUTHAMPTON, N. Y., July 2.—HERE has been an influx of visitors who will remain over the Fourth, and this makes a long holiday for business men. Next week the hospitality of Southampton will be taxed for the many who are coming here for the marriage of Miss Margaret Alwyn Krech, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin W. Krech, to Mr. William Sheffield Cowles, Jr., son of Rear Admiral William Sheffield Cowles and Mrs. Cowles, which will take place on July 9 in St. Andrew's Church.

It would not seem quite proper if Southampton did not have at least one wedding of its regular season. Last summer the engagement of Miss Krech and Mr. Cowles was announced the same time as that of her sister, Miss Helen Krech, to Mr. L. Stuart Wing, who were married last November in St. Bartholomew's Church in New York.

The quaint church in which the wedding of next week will take place is close by the sea, and is part of it, formerly served as a life saving station. The wedding guests will begin to arrive next Friday and will be entertained at various villas, although some of them who are now in their country places at neighboring resorts will motor here that day and others will arrive by the regular morning train that leaves New York at 10 o'clock. The bridegroom-elect is a nephew of the late Col. Theodore Roosevelt, and the various members of that family who are in Oyster Bay will be here for the event. Mr. Theodore Douglas Robinson, a cousin on the Roosevelt side, will serve as best man. Mr. Cowles and his ushers, all Yale men, will include Messrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, Shepard Krech, brother of the bride; Godfrey E. Rockefeller, Edward Winter, Edward Bangs, William Litt, Barrett Henningway, Dunham Barney, Harvey Bradley, Wilbur Staunton and Stephen Y. Hord, the latter being the captain of the victorious Yale crew at the varsity race of last week in New London.

The reception and wedding breakfast will follow the ceremony at Hedgerows, the summer home of the bride's parents, situated on a picturesque spot on the border of Lake Agawam. A huge marriage will be erected for the breakfast and all the festivities will take place out of doors.

The ceremony is to be performed by the Rev. Dr. Endicot Peabody, who will be with Mr. and Mrs. Henry P. Davison at their country place near Locust Valley.
