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HARDING TO REVISE SENATE'S SCHEDULE

New Legislative Action Forecast From Message Monday.

TO ABANDON RECESS

Soldier Bonus Bill Will Be Buried in the Finance Committee.

RUSH BEER MEASURE

Agreement Seen in Conference Report on Naval Appropriation.

The legislative programme of the Senate is to undergo a complete revision as the result of President Harding's influence. With the return next week of Senator Lodge, Republican leader, it is understood a thorough understanding will be had subject to minor changes based on the character of the special message of the President, which is looked for Monday. Here is the tentative programme likely to be agreed upon:

The Senate will abandon immediate proposals for a recess and will remain in continuous session at least until July 22, the day the tariff bill is expected to be received from the House.

The soldiers' bonus bill will be sent back to the Finance Committee for an indefinite period.

The Willis-Campbell anti-beer bill will be completed and passed in as short a time as its opponents will permit, although they are likely to prolong debate.

The measures backed by the agricultural bloc of the Senate, including the Norris \$100,000,000 Farm Export Corporation bill, agricultural representation on the Federal Reserve Board, an increase to \$25,000 in the amount that may be lent to an individual under the Federal farm loan act, will be given consideration and probably passed.

Free Toll to Pass.

The Borah bill to restore free tolls for American coastwise shipping through the Panama Canal will be given a place on the calendar and probably passed without prolonged debate.

The Senate will agree finally to the conference report on the naval appropriation bill, the deadlock now being broken between the two branches of Congress.

The above is expected to occupy most of the time of the Senate while the House is completing the tariff bill. After the Senate receives that measure and refers it to the Finance Committee it is probable a series of three day recesses can be arranged under a "gentlemen's agreement," but with no formal Senate recess such as was originally proposed by Senator Lodge.

In some authoritative quarters the belief is strong that President Harding will recommend completion of revenue revision ahead of tariff revision. Should he do so the Senate Finance Committee is prepared to take up revenue revision ahead of the tariff just as soon as both measures reach the Senate. The Senate cannot under the Constitution originate

either. If that were possible the Senate would begin revenue revision at once.

Revision in Revenues.

The Finance Committee may decide to take up revenue revision even if it is not specifically dealt with in the message. Early in the session there was a preponderance of Republican sentiment in favor of it, and it was only because of the refusal of the Ways and Means Committee to write the tax law first that blocked it in the beginning of the Administration.

Senator Watson (Ind.), the prime mover for early tax revision, told THE NEW YORK HERALD to-day he expected to make another speech to the Senate soon in favor of revenue revision in the hope of swinging that body into line for aggressive action to that end. He is confident such a move will meet the approval of the President and declares the country would welcome it with enthusiasm.

A possible barrier in the way of tax revision, first in the Senate, is prolongation in the House of approval of the revenue bill, which is to follow immediately when the tariff bill is completed. Authorities on the Ways and Means Committee stated to THE NEW YORK HERALD to-day that it is likely to take the House more than six weeks to complete the revenue bill. In that event the Finance Committee may report the tariff bill to the Senate and make such headway with it as is possible until the revenue bill reaches them.

Incidentally the probability that an emergency tariff bill may have to be continued by joint resolution was under discussion at the Capitol to-day. It became a law May 27 and lasts six months, taking it up to November 27. The discussion was only general, the belief being that both the tariff and revenue bills may be completed by that date.

RELIEF FOR AMUNDSEN SHIP.

Revenue Cutter Bear on Way With Help.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The United States revenue cutter Bear, detailed to the Alaskan station, is now on her way from Nome to the point off the Siberian coast where the exploring vessel Maude of the Amundsen expedition has been frozen in the ice, according to radio messages received here to-day by Coast Guard Headquarters.

The Maude, which was being used to map new sections of the Arctic Circle, was reported in distress by Capt. Amundsen upon his arrival at Nome some time ago after an overland journey, and the commanding officer of the Bear agreed to go to its assistance. The exploring vessel is located off the Siberian coast about 800 miles north of Nome, the message said.

COPS WIN RACE WITH BANK ROBBERS' CAR

Bandits Hurl Out Bills and Coin to Get People in Path of Pursuing Police Motor.

CHICAGO, July 9.—After a drive of twenty miles along the drainage canal a motor load of policemen this afternoon overtook a bandit car containing six men who an hour earlier had held up and stolen \$25,000 from the State Bank of Clearing in the far southwest corner of Chicago. Three of the bandits were captured.

One of the men captured was Martin (Big Six) Slick, who was released from prison May 14, 1921, by an order of the Supreme Court, which granted a review of his case. Slick was convicted of participation in the robbery of the Heller-Rose Company in 1918, when jewelry worth \$100,000 was stolen. The other two were Michael Grany and Harry Fields. Grany was released from Joliet penitentiary a month ago.

One of the spectacles of the sensational chase was the ruse of the bandits to halt the police car. Roaring along the hard road highway in a green touring car, they tossed handfuls of money over each side of the car. The wondering men and women along the roadway ran into the road to grab the fluttering bills and hampered the speed of the pursuing car. At several points it barely avoided striking those who gambled with injury to enrich themselves.

Five of the bandits entered the bank. The sixth sat at the wheel in the green car. All were heavily armed. At the bank it was said that they were "very polite." Their etiquette consisted of drawing revolvers and threatening Lambert Bera, cashier; W. L. Duerr, teller; Miss Lillian Jacobs, stenographer, and three depositors—one a woman.

Three of the bandits marched their prisoners to the vault, another began sweeping the big rolls of bills into a suitcase he carried and a fifth stood guard at the door. The streets outside were crowded. This seemed to make the "sentry" nervous, and he finally gave the signal for retreat.
