General Cut in Theatre Prices as New Season Opens

Managers Inclined to Make \$2.50 Top Price for Dramatic Productions.

The budding theatrical season, like the calendar of spring, offers hope eternal for the pocketbooks of theatre patrons. LONDON, July 28.—The Right Hon. William L. Ashmead-Bartlett-Burdett-Coutts, who has been a member of Parliament for the Abbey Division of Westminster since 1885, died today.

Death occurred at Holly Lodge, Highgate. Mr. Bartlett-Coutts had been ill for several months with arterial trouble. It had been arranged to amputate one of his legs on Wednesday, but Tuesday night his illness took a sudden turn for the worse.

William Bartlett-Coutts was born in 1851 in the United States. He was the second son of the late Ellis Bartlett of Plymouth, Mass. His mother was the daughter of John King Ashmead of Philadelphia.
