Lines Operating 61,245 Miles Report \$29,261,000 Net Operating Income.

Preliminary reports for June giving operating results of sixty-nine Class 1 railroads, operating 61,245 miles of line out of a total of 235,000 miles, show net operating income, after expenses, taxes and adjustment of joint facility rents, of \$29,261,000, in contrast to a net operating deficit of \$10,950,000 in June, 1920, according to the Bureau of Railway Economics.

The figures for the sixty-nine roads indicate a heavy shrinkage in traffic compared with that of the corresponding month, offset in the net operating income by a 21 per cent reduction in operating expenses, particularly those for maintenance of equipment, water and structures.
