WINS DIVORCE DECREE FROM EXPERT ON LOVE Mrs. R. T. Morris Had Canadian Guide as Witness. Special Despatch to THE NEW YORK HERALD. Poughkeepsie, July 29.—Mrs. Albee Reynaud Maserugi Morris won an interlocutory decree of divorce in the Superior Court to-day from Dr. Robert Tuttle Morris, surgeon and author of 616 Madison avenue, New York city. The decree, which was awarded by Justice Morschauser, followed a trial two weeks ago, in which a Canadian guide was the principal witness and in which Dr. Morris made no defence.

Dr. Morris, whose published works have a reputation as the hardest to read, works like a professor of surgery of the Post Graduate Medical School and Hospital, and Mrs. Albee Reynaud Maserugi was married June 4, 1898. In published interviews at the time of the divorce proceedings, Dr. Morris ascribed the bringing of the suit to his wife's unreasonable jealousy. He said the trip he made with the young woman to the Canadian wilds was a womanly innocent, and the young woman was a patient Dr. Morris also, without referring to anybody in particular, warned her to avoid any further publicity in the "double rose" type of woman if they wanted a home. The double rose, he said, was ornamental, but had forgotten how to reproduce itself.

MRS. HEMMING CLAIMS WIDOW'S DOWER RIGHTS Sheriff Kelly Still Working on Murder Case. Mrs. Helen Henderson Hemming, widow of Henry G. Hemming, the broker who was slain in New York City a few weeks ago, filed notice in the surrogate's court, New York county, yesterday, that she intends to claim her rights as Hemming's widow, and asked that she be allowed to prove her claim. Her husband was killed in the murder case which is being tried in the surrogate's court. Sheriff Kelly of Sussex county questioned Mrs. Hemming again at Riverhead and declared he again had found discrepancies in her statements and in her testimony before the coroner. The Sheriff will have another conference with the District Attorney Monday.

TWO BIG HAMMERSTEIN COMPANIES BANKRUPT Combined Liabilities \$1,391,000; Assets \$10,000.

Henry C. Newirth, lawyer, of 362 Fifth avenue, filed yesterday in the United States District Court voluntary petitions in bankruptcy for Oscar Hammerstein, Inc., and the Hammerstein Opera Company, with offices at 315 West Thirty-fourth street. In the petition for Oscar Hammerstein, Inc., the liabilities are given as \$1,391,000, of which \$450,000 are secured claims, and \$841,000 unsecured claims. Taxes amounting to \$6,000 are due the city, the petition says. The assets, which consist of theatrical equipment, are given at \$10,000.

In the petition for the opera company the liabilities are given as \$621,400, of which \$20,800 are unsecured claims, \$500,600 are secured claims and \$6,000 taxes due the city. The assets are given as \$10,000. Both petitions are signed by Emma Swift Hammerstein. The filing of the petitions is the result of the equity suits brought against Oscar Hammerstein, Inc. by Mrs. M. H. Hammerstein, against whom an involuntary petition was filed last April, was adjudged a bankrupt on June 11.
