REFEREE'S POWERS SHOULD BE CURBED

Autocratic Tactics of Third Man in the Ring a Menace to Sport of Boxing. JUDGES A SAFEGUARD Long List of Unjust Verdicts by Officials Whose Power Was Supreme.

The dispute growing out of the Downey-Wilson contest has served to bring the autocratic referee into the limelight and to raise the question as to whether his powers should be curtailed. It is a serious problem as to whether the responsibility for deciding between two boxers should rest on the shoulders of one man. It seems to have been the opinion of the framers of the Walker law that it is inadvisable to trust one man with the task of deciding all questions arising during a boxing contest.

Unfortunate State of Affairs.

As a result of this unfortunate state of affairs, the spectators of the Wilson-O'Dowd bout in Madison Square Garden saw a referee calmly watching Wilson, as the titleholder battered O'Dowd below the waist for the fourth and never calling a halt on the illegal tactics. Even the fact that O'Dowd went to a hospital a few days after the contest and submitted to a serious operation, and has not been able to return to the ring since, did not seem to make any impression on the members of the Boxing Commission.

In the Cleveland contest between Wilson and Downey, the referee allowed Wilson to be the victim of a foul blow at a time when the titleholder was on the floor for the third time in the seventh round, and was helpless from blows on the jaw delivered by Downey. The referee decided to allow the action of the referee to decide as to foul blows is the most dangerous privilege that the officials possess.

Commission Has Power to Overrule

The Cleveland Commission also maintained that it had the power to overrule the action of a referee, and would exercise that right. The Massachusetts Commission takes an opposite stand, and declares that the referee is supreme after the gong opens the first round of a contest. The Massachusetts officials are under the impression that the Queensberry and London rules still are in force. Under the London rules the referee was supreme and his decision was irrevocable, but the London rules and the Queensberry rules are obsolete, and are not now enforced in any part of the world.

Boxing in Europe is governed by the rules of the International Boxing Union, and in America commission rules govern, nearly all codes being patterned after the Walker law regulations, which were formulated by a committee of the International Sporting Club.

The Walker law provides that the commission be vested with the "sole direction, management, control and jurisdiction over all boxing and sparring matches in New York State." Under the rules the referee has general supervision of the bout and the referee's word to the effect that his decisions are irrevocable.


On the contrary, it would appear that the powers of the commission are such as to justify a referee's decision where the latter apparently has erred. The former commission did so, but the present body seems to take the ground that the referee's ruling is final. As there are two judges in New York, action by the commission is not imperative, but in localities where there are no judges there should be revision of a referee's decision by the commission.

Resultant Evils.

In no branch of sport except boxing are the decisions of referees, judges or other officials irrevocable. In baseball there are two umpires to guard against mistakes and frequently one of the umpires who has made a ruling on a play in which the question was one of fact has consulted his fellow umpire and has reversed his decision. In football the referee's decisions are frequently reviewed by league presidents and reversed. This is a strong argument against one man being empowered to make decisions that cannot be reviewed. The evils resultant from the power held by boxing referees have been manifold, and the records of the ring are full of atrociously unjust decisions. Incompetent or dishonest referees have deprived victors of their dues in many of the most important ring engagements in history and have frequently saved defeated champions from the loss of their titles.

A most flagrant example was furnished in the bout between John C. Heenan, American champion, and Tom Sayers, British champion. They met at Farnborough, England, April 17, 1860, Heenan battered Sayers to helplessness,

Kilbane Proves to Be Good Matchmaker

CLEVELAND, Aug. 6.—Johnny Kilbane of Cleveland, featherweight champion, and Danny Frush of Baltimore, challenger, signed articles of agreement today for a twelve round title bout to a decision at an open air show here on or about September 17. Two weeks ago Frush signed with one promoter and a week ago today Kilbane signed with another. The promoters got together today and agreed to stage the contest. Kilbane is to get \$60,000 win, lose or draw, and Frush is to receive \$25,000. Frush is to weigh in at 125 pounds. Kilbane is not requested to make weight. The Cleveland Boxing Commission will select the referee. Mayor W. S. Fitzgerald has announced he will personally supervise the arrangements for the fight to avoid a repetition of the recent unsatisfactory Wilson-Downey contest.

Power of Referees.

John Smith, heavyweight champion of England, was beaten by Frank Slavin Dec. 23, 1889, and also by Jake Kilrain in 1887. Yet the ring was broken into in each event and the referee declared the bout drawn. John L. Sullivan refused to come out of his corner for the seventh round of a bout with Dominick McCaffrey at Chester Driving Park, Cincinnati, Aug. 29, 1888. Although the articles of agreement called for "six rounds or to a finish," McCaffrey had battered the Boston boy so thoroughly that Sullivan decided to postpone additional fighting to some other day. During the argument Ed Tate, the referee, sneaked out of the ring and went to his home in Toledo. Two days after the contest Tate sent out word that "Sullivan was the winner." It is so set down in the records and is one of the most amazing "irrevocable decisions" in the history of pugilism.

Boxer Dies of Injury.

COLUMBUS, Aug. 6.—Earl Welch, 20 years of age, died here today of a fractured skull, sustained Thursday when knocked to the floor in a boxing match with Harold Myers. Both are of Columbus and were engaged in a friendly bout. Myers is being held by the police.

John and Wills Barred.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 6.—The proposed bout between Jack Johnson, former champion, and Harry Wills has been barred here. Director of Public Safety Cortelyou last night declared Johnson cannot box in Philadelphia as long as he holds office.

Freeman Shades Welling.

AURORA, Ill., Aug. 6.—Salvor Freeman, Chicago lightweight, received the unofficial decision over Joe Welling, also of Chicago, in their ten round boxing match here last night.

Herman to Box Montreal.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 6.—Pete Herman, bantamweight champion of the world, has been matched with Young Montreal of Providence, R. I. for a ten round no decision bout here Labor Day. It was announced here today. Young Montreal got two decisions over Herman in recent bouts in Boston.

TENDLER BELIEVES HE WILL WIN TITLE

Quaker Southpaw Bubbling With Confidence as to Bout With Leonard.

I want fight fans throughout the country to know that I have all the confidence in the world that I will win from Benny Leonard when we meet on the night of Friday, August 12, at the National League Ball Park, Philadelphia. Since the clinching of the match, which is scheduled for eight rounds, I have been asked a hundred times if I think that I will win by a knockout. I want that title, I have wanted it for two years, I am going to try to win by a knockout. I do not boldly say that I will knock out Benny Leonard. He is one of the greatest boxers that ever lived. But he is not knockout proof. No one is, and I'm going in there to try my level best.

If I see an opportunity to shoot over a knockout punch at the sound of the opening bell I'm going to do it and will keep trying until the finish. Leonard can be knocked down and if I do succeed in knocking him down I am satisfied that he will not be among those standing when the match is over. I saw Ritchie Mitchell knock down Leonard in New York not so long ago. Mitchell and I have beat several times. I am positive that I can hit harder than Ritchie. Leonard often has accused me of being afraid of him—that I was challenging him only for the publicity. I'll prove without a doubt that I am not afraid of him. I'm not going in there to box a defensive battle, just to see if I can stay the limit. I am not telling my plan of battle but will say that no one will hold anything against me when they see me in action against the champion. There are going to be a lot of surprised people at the Phillies park. If I will be surprised—won't you have an alibi. I will be as fit as a fiddle for the most important contest of my career.

College Pitchers Held Their Own Last Season

Despite the lively ball this season, college pitchers managed rather nobly. No fewer than ten of the twenty-five receiving rating turned in earned run columns showing fewer than the desired tallies for some of their deliveries. Bill Hays of Holy Cross shows the lowest total with 6.60, but the pitching title really went to the pitcher who made the most of his team mate, Jim Tunney. Horan pitched only one complete game. In seven contests Tunney allowed his opponents an average of 1.83 runs per game.

Tunney also leads the pitchers in the number of batters struck out. In twenty-eight, Ralph Knight of Brown is second, with twenty-two, and F. V. Tracy of Dartmouth third, with twenty-one. Bill Hays of Holy Cross has a better comparative record than either of these, however, with seventeen men fanned in fifteen innings, an average of more than ten per game. His mark stood up when he fanned fourteen Dartmouth batters on Decoration Day. Jim Tunney gave the smallest percentage of bases on balls per game.

On the basis of games won and lost Walter Larson of Pennsylvania leads the pitchers. He registered three victories and had no defeats. The relative rank of the pitchers on the won and lost basis is given in the column following the one showing the percentage of their victories. Larson had the rather dubious honor of giving the greatest number of bases on balls, 35. Eddie Gunde of Harvard was second, with 23.
