

TWO WALL ST. MEN IN WORTHINGTON NET

Indictments Against Prominent Brokers in Huge Mail Thefts Expected.

RECALLS BOND MURDER Band of Crooks 'With Undreamed of Power' Said to Be Involved.

WOMAN'S LIPS SEALED Secretary to Arthur M. Goldsmith Denies Cashing Coupons, Although Identified.

Special Despatch to THE NEW YORK HERALD. CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—Two new indictments will name prominent Wall Street men in connection with the operations of John W. Worthington and Owen Evans, alleged "brains" of a nation wide gang of mail thieves, are expected soon, Federal officials said today.

Patrick Roche, special agent of the Department of Justice, returned today to Chicago from New York, where he questioned Arthur Goldsmith, a broker. "The net is tightening around two well known New York bond brokers," said Mr. Roche. "I am not at liberty to name them because we are all ready to indict them."

When asked if the New York brokers were connected with the Binkowitz bond murder case Roche said he could not answer any questions. A letter mailed in Detroit and received today purports to outline the development of the "Worthington gang" from a bushwhacker hand in 1890 to an organization of crooks with "undreamed of power." Officials kept secret the name of the writer. The letter was typewritten with many mistakes in technique and grammar, but it was assertive. George E. Kenny of the Thiel Detective Agency today said that his agency soon expects to give the Government information of bank swindling in Montreal, alleged to have been done by the Worthington band. The investigators today produced another girl for the mysterious "Marie," whose photograph and letters were found in Worthington's office. She is, it is believed, Marie McKee of Los Angeles.

Caroline Hess, secretary to Arthur M. Goldsmith, was arrested here yesterday by William F. Murphy, postal inspector. She is charged with receiving, concealing and aiding in the disposition of goods stolen from the mails, particularly a \$5,000 Liberty bond which was stolen from the Dearborn street post office in Chicago, the coupon of which she is charged with having cashed. When taken before United States Commissioner Samuel M. Hitchcock she said she was 42 years old, a clerk, and gave her address as 232 East Sixty-ninth street, the home of Goldsmith. She denied the charges and was held in \$1,500 bail pending hearing, which was set for September 19.

Before arraignment Miss Hess was interrogated by Maxwell S. Mattuck, Assistant United States Attorney, who questioned her about her duties as secretary to Goldsmith. She denied having ever cashed a coupon for a \$5,000 Liberty bond at Post and Station "Y" and continued her denial after she was identified by a postal clerk as the woman who cashed the coupon. Mr. Mattuck declared he has proof that Miss Hess cashed coupons for \$50,000 worth of Liberty bonds, but only included one bond in the Government's charge preferring to make further charge later.

RICKENBACKER DISCOVERS NEW ASTRAL BODY NEAR SUN

Noted American Ace and Major Reed Chambers See With Naked Eye at Lick Observatory Possible Birth of Star or Comet.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Aug. 8.—An object viewed last night at sunset from Lick Observatory, near here, may or may not be a new star or comet, W. W. Campbell, director of the observatory, said today, but he considered the appearance of such importance that he notified the directors of other observatories to be on the lookout. The view from Lick Observatory was with the naked eye. If observations prove this to be a new astral body credit for its discovery probably will go to Capt. Eddle Rickenbacker, former army air man and American ace, and will be shared by Major Reed Chambers, also a noted army flyer.

ALIENS IN EXCESS OF QUOTA ADMITTED

Personal Bond Required and Number Charged to Year's Total.

AMENDMENT IS OFFERED Secretary Davis Would Raise Quota to 1,200 From Any Nation.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Immigrants in excess of July and August quotas, now held at various ports, will be admitted under personal bond and charged to the year's totals, Commissioner-General Husband of the Immigration Bureau, announced today. The order was issued after a conference with ship line representatives.

The State Department probably will be asked to make formal request of the Greek Government to prevent Greek lines from disregarding the percentage immigration law, it was stated today while the Shipping Board would be requested to deal with an American company operating board ships. The order will admit about 1,000 immigrants. Commissioner Husband said the companies represented at the conference had agreed to avoid exceeding quotas in the future.

An amendment to the law that would permit as many as 1,200 immigrants to enter the United States from any nation will be introduced in Congress at the request of Secretary Davis, it was announced at the Department of Labor. The present law, which fixes the maximum number of immigrants from any country at 3 per cent. of the total in this country in 1910, affects especially, it was explained, Australia, New Zealand and other countries, which in recent years have sent 1,000 or 1,200 immigrants of a desirable type, whereas now their quotas are below 200 each. Few countries in Europe would be affected by the amendment, it was stated.

About 800 nationals of Poland, Greece, Jugoslavia and Turkey at the Ellis Island immigration station are affected by the new ruling of Commissioner-General Husband. Work of releasing them was begun as soon as word was received there of the new order. The majority of the immigrants were Greeks who arrived here August 1.

ADMITS ALASKA HIT REEF AT FULL SPEED

No Decrease Because of Heavy Fog, Says Engineer on Duty at Time.

LIFEBOATS DEFECTIVE Passenger Testifies Crew Was Demoralized in Handling Them.

EUREKA, CAL., Aug. 8.—First admission by an officer that the steamer Alaska was proceeding under full speed despite the heavy fog when she crashed on Blunt's Reef Saturday night was made today by S. A. Carlson, third assistant engineer, in testimony he gave at an inquest. Carlson said he was on duty when the ship struck.

The eighteenth body, that of a man yet unidentified, from the sunken vessel, was found today under the light-house at Cape Mendocino. Late today an inquest over the body of Charles Heane, chief steward, was held. The jury found Heane came to his death "through drowning as a result of the wreck of the steamer Alaska." George Goodall, a passenger of Spokane, in his testimony, said members of the crew made efforts to get the passengers off the ship, but became demoralized when it came to handling the lifeboats. He declared the lifeboats were not in proper condition.

GOV. SMALL DEFIES SHERIFF'S WARRANT

'No Power on Earth Can Arrest Me,' He Says to Official.

Special Despatch to THE NEW YORK HERALD. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 8.—Gov. Len Small this afternoon defied Sheriff Henry Mester of Sangamon county by arrest him on the charge of embolism of State interest funds for which the Governor has been indicted.

Sheriff Mester visited here this afternoon to inform him that he intended serving the three warrants. Gov. Small continued to defy the sheriff and threatened to claim immunity and threatened to sue the sheriff if he attempted to serve the warrants with him when he made his call upon the Governor. "Governor, I must serve the warrants. Will you come to my office or shall I bring you in?" the Sheriff is reported to have said.

"No power on earth can arrest me," the Governor replied, "and I intend to ignore any such action on your part." "Gov. Small suggested to me I would be subject to suit on my bonds if I persist in carrying out the court order," said the Sheriff, "and intimated that if I attempted to arrest him he will have my bonds forfeited, but I intend to carry out the orders of the court." Sheriff Mester declared that he would use force if the Governor refused to surrender. "I have warned the Governor for the last time, now the law must take its course," he said.

Gov. Small arrived at the Executive Mansion unexpectedly during the night, having driven by automobile from Kanakake and his first public act on reaching his office in the Capitol Building shortly before noon today was the announcement of a number of important State appointments. Among the places filled were Director of Finance and members of the State Tax Commission. The appointments constituted the first official act performed in his office here since Gov. Small was indicted by the Sangamon county Grand Jury twenty days ago.

After he announced the appointments, Gov. Small entered a two hour conference with members of his council. When he emerged this afternoon the Governor indicated that he has not faltered in his determination to protest against arrest.

"Some of my official business has necessarily been handicapped recently and I am here to do some work," the Governor said. "I expect to attend to official business only, and no power of earth is going to stop me if I can help it."

VAUDEVILLE HOUSES UNHURT BY STRIKE

Outlaw Musicians' Union Walkout Makes No Impression on Managers.

NEW MEN RECRUITED Motion Picture House Directors Await Development in Federation Squabble.

The walkout of musicians in the vaudeville houses yesterday to join their brothers from the big movie palaces who had quit the day preceding did not embarrass the various circuits, as had been hoped by the members of the Musical Mutual Protective Association, who were either locked out by the managers or else were striking in protest against the 20 per cent. wage decrease ordered by the managers.

The afternoon performances were conducted as usual with orchestras. At the B. F. Keith headquarters it was stated that all their big houses had complete orchestras, recruited from local musicians from out of town or from local musicians. About 20 per cent. of the Keith musicians agreed to take the reduced wages, and it is expected that before the week is over others will come fluttering back. The new scale gives the musicians \$45 to \$50 a week, with \$80 for the leader, as against \$56 to \$70, with \$90 for the conductor, under the old scale. Virtually complete orchestras were reported from the B. S. Moss, F. F. Proctor, Marcus Loew and William Fox houses.

DOG RESCUES VISITORS LOST IN ADIRONDACKS

Four Girls and Two Men Lose Trail on Mountain.

Y., Aug. 8.—After being lost in the Adirondack woods for thirty hours, a party of four girls and two men were rescued when a dog stumbled on them and barked, summoning his master. Those in the party were the Misses A. T. and Gertrude Kennedy of New York, Miss Nettie Carnes of Westfield, N. Y.; Miss Edna Van Wageningen, Rockville Centre, L. I.; E. W. Manning of Mount Vernon and Max F. Bler, 1498 Bedford avenue, Brooklyn.

They started out Saturday afternoon to climb Black Bear Mountain, but lost the trail. They kept fire going all night, but were not seen. The next day Bler saw a clump of bushes of wild berries and fed them to the women.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—A lone bandit held up and robbed Leonard Murray, a messenger for the Jaffers State Bank, of \$10,000 in the heart of Chicago's financial district this afternoon. The bandit, a roughly dressed youth, apparently was awaiting the messenger's appearance, for as Murray got opposite him he hurried over with a drawn revolver. "Give me that watch, or I'll kill you," he said in a low voice, punching his victim in the ribs with the weapon. Murray complied and the robber, giving him a push, sped into the crowd of people and got away.

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COPPERHEAD KNOCKS RELIGIOUS THEORY

Minister and Brother's Immunity Proves Disastrous.

NEWTON, Wis., Aug. 8.—William Edmonds in a critical condition, but his brother, the Rev.
