

FRENCH LINE DENIES VACCINATION BLAME

Injections at Havre Made by Physicians Acting Under American Authority.

ROCHAMBEAU DEFENDED

Ship Carries First Class Only, Says Manager's Reply to Complaints.

Protests of the French liner Rochambeau's passengers against vaccination recently at Havre drew a denial yesterday from A. T. Henderson, passenger traffic manager for the line. Noting that Dr. B. S. Pollak, medical director of the Hudson County Tuberculosis Hospital at Secaucus, N. J., had said the vaccination was below the proper standard and that Dr. Pollak was joined by other responsible persons on the Rochambeau's passenger list, Mr. Henderson asserted:

"It is a well known fact that the American Government a few months ago established health offices in the different ports of embarkation in Europe. American doctors are in charge and the decision rests with them as to whether or not an American or an alien, no matter in what class they travel, coming to America from any infected country should be vaccinated.

"Neither the French line, the English line or any lines operating steamships between Europe and America have any discretion in the matter.

"The alleged statements published in the newspapers by passengers on the

Rochambeau that the vaccinating was done by French doctors in unsanitary conditions is absolutely without foundation. It is possible, however, that American surgeons in charge at the port of Havre may have employed French assistants, but any sensible person would readily realize that the health officer accredited to the American Government would not permit any unsanitary conditions to exist as far as vaccination is concerned and remain in charge for any length of time.

"As to passengers being lured on a second class boat by false promises, this is absolutely untrue, as the Rochambeau has been operated since she was put into service as a one cabin steamship. It is advertised as such and is known by all our clients to be in that category. She is not a second class steamship, but a one class cabin boat. The food and the service are all that can be desired, a fact that is proved by the fact that this vessel carries practically a full complement of passengers east bound and west bound, even during the dull season."

FREED FROM DEATH HOUSE.

GOLD MAD THROUGHS FLY TO EMPTY CAVE

Robischon Superintendent Has Fighting Task to Ward Off Intruders.

Great crowds advanced on E. W. Robischon's Ramapo Hills estate, near Singac, N. J., yesterday to assist him and Joe Carpenter, superintendent, to lift Wilhelm Besthorn's \$12,000 in double eagles out of its mountain cave. But the money remained unfound.

Joe Carpenter, his employer and Mrs. Robischon said that there was nothing to the gold story. Horace E. Dickinson, vice-president of E. W. Robischon, Inc., 1133 Broadway, said that there

was absolutely no connection between the report of the finding of Wilhelm Besthorn's treasure on Thursday afternoon and any real estate proposition Mr. Robischon might be entertaining.

"We are in the business of making holed," said Mr. Dickinson. "We don't deal in real estate. I do not know that Mr. Robischon is offering any portion of his place for sale, but I presume if any one wanted to buy they might do so. Mr. Robischon is a retiring man and does not care for publicity. Probably he will explore the cave discovered by Joe Carpenter when he can do so quietly."

Joe Carpenter was stationed on the driveway from the public road to the Robischon house. One after another he turned automobiles back. He argued prospective prospectors out of the place, even going to the extent of suggesting hurling a few out. But the place is big and rambling and Joe couldn't cover the entire frontier. Here and there invaders trickled in until the Robischon place, once owned by Ernestine Schumann-Holtek, was being trampled by a thousand intruding feet.

JERSEY TRACTION FARE UP FROM 7 TO 8 CENTS

Trenton, Aug. 20.—The Public Utility Commission to-day allowed the New Jersey and Pennsylvania Traction Company an increase in fare of from seven to eight cents in each of four zones between this city and Princeton, about ten miles, after the application for a ten cent fare was refused by the commission. The company must sell four tickets for thirty cents, and the rate between points within the limits of Trenton will be three cents. The rate to school children is twenty-five tickets for \$1, good only on school days.

The board reserved the right to revoke the new rate if conditions warrant. The company is required to file monthly reports showing the financial condition of the line. The new rate goes into effect five days after its filing with the board by the company and after the company submits proof that the new rate has been posted in the cars.

3,500,000 CHILDREN KEPT FROM STARVING

Hoover Committee Reports on Work in Austria.

The peak of the child feeding operations of the American Relief Administration, headed by Herbert Hoover, in Austria, was reached June 19 last when rations were issued to 379,773 Austrian children. On July 1 there were 377,253 rations issued and a gradual reduction in the number is anticipated from now on.

By means of the \$29,000,000 the American people contributed during the European Relief Council drive, the American Relief Administration has been able to save from starvation approximately 3,500,000 children in the war-stricken countries of central and eastern Europe. Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and the Baltic territories have all benefited.
