Mrs. Carnegie's Shadowbrook Is Taxed at \$261,825

Pays Assessment on Highest Valuation of Any Estate in the Berkshires.

RETURNS from the Berkshires assessors, made public today, show that Mrs. Andrew Carnegie's estate, Shadowbrook, assessed at \$261,825, is the most valuable place in the Berkshires. The combined properties of Mrs. John E. Parsons and her son, Mr. Cortland Field Bishop, rank second, with a tax levy on \$252,025, and Mrs. Henry White is third at \$234,450.

The largest single property in area in the Berkshires region is that owned by the William C. Whitney heirs on October Mountain. This property of 10,000 acres, located in the three towns of Washington, Lee and Becket, has an assessed valuation of \$190,510. Lenox has lost this year the tax levy on the art collection of Mrs. Robert W. Paterson, assessed last year at \$31,000. The collection was shipped last fall to the Brooklyn Museum of Fine Arts.

B. Osgood Field, completing 383 acres of the town of Stockbridge and Lee is down for \$198,000. Mrs. Raymond T. Baker, whose 314 acre Holmwood Park is one of the beautiful places of the section, is assessed at \$137,500. With a total assessed valuation of \$5,763,482, Stockbridge has per capita wealth of \$3,367, the highest of any town in Massachusetts. The per capita wealth of Lenox, with a valuation of \$7,212,361, is \$2,800. The population of Lenox is 2,881, and Stockbridge 1,761.
