

RAID WITH SUICIDE STIRS CUSTOM MEN

They Think Attack on Ship Was 'Unethical' and Protest to Washington.

CONCERNED BY CHARGES

Federal Attorney Says Watchman Was Bribed by Revenue Agents.

As an aftermath of the raid early Friday morning on board the Greek steamship King Alexander by Federal liquor and narcotic agents, Custom officials charged yesterday that the raid in which five men were wounded in a pistol battle and one of the raiders took his own life, "was unethical if not illegal." George W. Aldridge, Collector of Customs, said he had taken up the action of the revenue agents with Washington. The Custom men have the sole authority. Mr. Aldridge explained, to make raids on merchant ships in this port. He said: "Had we been called on we would have been glad to cooperate. In that event the raid would have been a success and the decks would not have been littered with dead and wounded."

What seemed to cause the Custom authority most concern was the veiled charge of Wallace E. J. Collins, United States Attorney in Brooklyn, that Custom men might be involved in the conspiracy to smuggle into the country the largest cargo of liquor and drugs aboard the steamship. Mr. Collins said James Brennan, watchman of the pier to which the King Alexander was moored, had been bribed by the revenue agents to help carry out their supposed scheme to purchase the liquor and narcotics. Brennan disappeared after the raid but was arrested yesterday and was held by the United States Commissioner, Mr. Hennessy, for further examination.

Sabbas Mentinha, fourth officer of the vessel, whom Ralph Oyer, narcotic agent, said he dealt with in the arrangements for the purchase, was found in a coal bunker of the steamship. It was thought Mentinha had fallen overboard and was drowned in the fight. The harbor police spent the greater part of Friday night grappling for his body. Mentinha also was held by Commissioner Hennessy for further examination.

Reports that Frank J. Fitzpatrick, narcotic agent, had been murdered instead of committing suicide were allayed by an autopsy by Dr. Charles West, Medical Examiner in Brooklyn. Powder marks were found around the wound in Fitzpatrick's chest, and there also were similar marks on the fingers of the agent's right hand. The bullet that caused death entered about the fifth rib near the center of the body and passed through the ninth rib at the back.

The investigations started immediately after the raid and suicide were continued by Mr. Collins and the Internal Revenue Department. Col. O. G. Forrer, Assistant United States Supervisor of Narcotics, who was hurried to New York by David H. Blair, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, went to the Kings County Morgue and viewed the body of Fitzpatrick. He also interviewed Ralph Oyer and agents, and the father and brother of Fitzpatrick, who came here to claim his body. Col. Forrer was told of the previous ill health of Fitzpatrick, which up to the present is the only assignable cause for his having shot himself.

FOCH EAGER TO MEET PEOPLE OF AMERICA

K. of C. Officials Hear of Plans for Connig Visit.

Marshal Foch wants to meet the plain folks of America when he visits this country in November. European Commissioner Edward L. Hearn of the Knights of Columbus, in a letter received by the Knights of Columbus supreme officers' meeting at the Hotel Commodore to-day, made this statement. Mr. Hearn states that Marshal Foch has frequently expressed his eagerness to meet Americans in every section of the United States, so that he can know at first hand the people that produced the A. E. F.

"After the American Legion convention in Kansas City, which he will attend, and after an official day with the Knights of Columbus and, of course, several necessary public functions, the Marshal will meet the general public as freely as his time will permit," Mr. Hearn wrote.

TRULY WARNER SUES MRS. DUNLAP'S ESTATE

\$10,572 Involved in Dispute Over Hat Properties.

Proceedings started yesterday in the Surrogate's Court require David D. Well, temporary administrator of the estate of Mrs. Amelia N. Dunlap, widow of the hat manufacturer, who died May 2, to show cause why he should not pay \$10,572 to Truly Warner, the latter, of 251 West Eighty-ninth street, and \$5,000 to William Allen Dunlap, a son of the deceased, of 305 West Eighty-first street. Warner in his petition says the money is due him on a judgment he recovered in the Supreme Court against Mrs. Dunlap in the controversy over the sale of the Dunlap hat properties.

Dunlap, in his petition, says he needs the \$5,000, and despite the fact that the Dunlap will is tied up pending the trial of a contest, he has a certain trust fund under the will, amounting to \$25,000, and even if the will is broken he still will have one-fourth of the estate.

JOHN STEEL MUST PAY \$500 WEEKLY TO WIFE

Mrs. Sidonie B. Steel cannot have John W. Steel, tenor of the Ziegfeld "Follies," adjudged in contempt for failure to provide alimony if he pays \$500 weekly, beginning to-morrow, until the entire amount due is paid. This was decided yesterday by Justice Lydon in Supreme Court.

To escape Ludlow Street Jail Steel must pay the \$500 a week alimony recently granted by the court, and also another \$250 a week for ten weeks to wipe out his arrears of \$2,500. Francis X. Goetz, counsel for Steel, said that while the tenor had good income he had many debts which were contracted between seasons. He said Steel could clean up the indebtedness by Christmas provided he was not forced to stop playing in the "Follies."


