

OCTOBER WILL BRING NO DROP IN RENTS

Folks Who Have Delayed Leasing Seem Doomed to Disappointment.

APARTMENTS ARE SCARCE

'Two Rooms and Bath' Are Plentiful, but Prices Are Beyond Real Value.

Many apartment hunters who have been waiting for the approach of October 1 in the hope that rentals would drop are bound to be disappointed, according to C. Merritt Ives, vice-president of Pease & Elliman, real estate dealers. He said yesterday that no decrease is to be expected except in a few cases in which excessive prices were asked.

"As a matter of fact," said Mr. Ives, "there are less apartments in the market to-day than any year previous, except the year 1920. It is true that there are a large number of two room and bath apartments being offered for rent in altered private houses at rentals which are way beyond the true value, and in order to rent them the owners will have to reduce their figures materially. However, in the modern buildings containing housekeeping apartments there is very limited selection.

"We have found that a great number of people who were looking for apartments early in the spring decided to wait until late in the season before taking an apartment, with the hope that rentals would drop. This will mean that a number of these people will be disappointed. The activity of the last week in apartment renting has taken up the majority of the better apartments, especially those renting in the neighborhood of from \$4,000 to \$7,000 per annum. The number of apartments of from six to nine rooms which would rent at the above figures is so small that there is practically no selection, and a person looking for such an apartment would be wise not to be too discriminating if the apartment meet with the majority of their requirements.

"We have had many cases in the last week where several persons wished to take the same apartment within a few hours of each other.

"Strange as it may seem, the situation in the furnished apartments is practically opposite to that in the unfurnished. Due, we believe, to general business depression, a great many people are offering their apartments for rent furnished at rentals that are out of proportion, in a great many cases. Up until two or three years ago the value of a furnished apartment for the season was a year's rental unfurnished. Many people in the last year or two have rented their apartments furnished, taking advantage of the fact that their leases were on a pre-war basis, and received 100 per cent. increase over the rent for the use of their furniture. This profit had become noised around, and many people are, in respect to the fact that they are paying on the new basis, a large number of them are basing their figures on 100 per cent. profit for the use of their furniture, which is prohibitive. We believe a fair rental for a furnished apartment at the present time to be 20 per cent. over the unfurnished value.

"However, it may be that there will be so many apartments in the market that this will not be obtainable, as we have never before had so many furnished apartments on our books for rent, with leases continuing in continually. There are numerous cases where similar apartments in the same building have been listed with us at figures varying as much as 50 per cent. Naturally, the cheaper of the apartments will be rented first, and the more expensive might lie idle all winter. We would especially advise any one considering subleasing their apartment furnished this winter to ask a moderate profit."

JERSEY CITY GOES DRY FOR 45 MINUTES

Reason, Repairing Break in a Six Foot Main.

Jersey City was without water for forty-five minutes yesterday morning when the water was again turned on there was a reduced supply, which will continue until a break in a six foot main at Summit and Carlton avenues is repaired. The break occurred a week ago and since then there has been a wastage of 4,000,000 gallons of water a day. Repairing of the break was put off until yesterday morning because there is less water consumed on Saturdays than on any day during the week.

The water was shut off at the Boonton Pumping Station at 7:30 A. M. It was turned on again at 7:45 A. M. Authorities of the Jersey City water department figure that the repair work will be completed this morning. The city consumes 50,000,000 gallons of water a day and has two reserve reservoirs containing 100,000,000 gallons of water, but it was decided these would not be touched unless in case of an emergency such as a big fire. Until the repair work is completed, if not this morning Jersey City will have to subsist on 25,000,000 gallons of water a day.

ROENTGEN RAY PIONEER HERE FROM GERMANY

Prof. Dessauer to Lecture on His Research Work.

With the formal ratification of the peace treaty with Germany, it is expected the exchange between the two nations of secrets of scientific accomplishment, interrupted by the advent of the war, will be resumed. One of the first of Germany's missionaries to inaugurate such a revival is Prof. Friedrich Dessauer of the University of Frankfurt, who arrived last week on the Nieuw Amsterdam of the Holland-American line and is at the Pennsylvania Hotel.

Prof. Dessauer comes at the invitation of the American Roentgen Ray Association to lecture on his research work at the annual meeting of the organization in Washington, the latter part of this month. Prof. Dessauer is one of the pioneer X-ray men of the world. He is said to have been the first to make X-ray pictures of the stomach and heart in 1-100th of a second, and to make real motion pictures of their action. In the early days of the use of the Roentgen ray he was among the first who sought to establish physical laws for the cure of cancer through use of the ray.

USES GAS TO KILL HERSELF.
