SINN FEIN ACCEPTS INVERNESS PARLEY

Answer Contains Qualification of Allegiance to the British Crown.

NOT BELIEVED SERIOUS

Concern Felt at De Valera and Childers in Delegation.

BOTH OF EXTREME VIEWS

Ulster Less Warlike and Outlook for Peace Considered Hopeful.

The Sinn Fein acceptance of the invitation to a conference at Inverness is on the way to Premier Lloyd George to-night. It is described as containing a qualification regarding acceptance by the Dail Eireann of allegiance to the Crown.

From Dublin, according to advices received by THE NEW YORK HERALD correspondent here, it is reported that this qualification is not serious and merely was inserted in the Irish note so that the Sinn Fein would not have to recede from its Republican platform without being able to show their followers something equally good as a means of protecting Irish freedom.

It was stated here that the British Cabinet was thoroughly aware of this attitude, and it is not believed there is anything in the Irish reply which will interrupt the negotiations.

The reported composition of the Sinn Fein delegation has occasioned some surprise and not a little concern here. It had been understood that the delegation would be headed by Arthur Griffith, but it is now indicated that De Valera himself is coming, with Erskine Childers, representing the extreme intellectual purists of the movement included in the Sinn Fein party.

While the presence of these men is considered to present certain difficulties in the way of a sort of round table five-and-take conference, Lloyd George is counted on to present arguments enough to enable Griffith and the practical element in the Sinn Fein to carry the point with their more difficult brethren.

Another extremely encouraging element in the situation is that Belfast is breathing much less fire. It is believed that the moderates like H. N. Pollock, Lord Londonderry and Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, will at last be able to get in good looks for peace and that the heated atmosphere is now decidedly clearer and cooler, since the Catholics and Protestants of The Queen's street area have signed a truce. It is also considered likely that assurances have been given that Ulster will not be abandoned entirely by the British Cabinet in the course of these negotiations. In view of the known attitude of the controlling majority at Dublin against any effort to coerce Ulster, either physically or economically, the entire Ulster problem is more hopeful to-night than at any time since Cromwell's plantations.

UNSAFE EVEN TO LOOK PICKLED IN ZION CITY

REVOLT IN CONSTANTINOPLE AGAIN CHECKED BY BRITISH

Plot to Slay Allied Leaders and Disrupt Loyal Indian Troops Is Traced to Angora, Turk Nationalist Capital—Many Arrests Are Demanded.

By the Associated Press. CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 12.—The discovery of a vast revolutionary plot at Constantinople is announced by the British authorities here.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The British Intelligence Department at Constantinople has discovered a plot, organized and subsidized from Angora, the Turkish Nationalist capital, to foment a revolution in Constantinople, according to Reuter despatches. It was planned to spread dissatisfaction among the loyal Indian troops and assassinate the leading allied officers. Seventeen desperadoes, it is reported, were brought to Constantinople to carry out the murder of British officers. They have demanded the arrest of those implicated.

Last June it was reported from Constantinople that a great uprising by Turks and Bolsheviks there had been frustrated through the vigilance of the police and military officers. Allied troops, acting under orders from Gen. Harrington, commander of the British forces in Constantinople, raided various hotels and houses, seized large quantities of arms and arrested more than fifty persons alleged to have been implicated in the movement.

Later, Cecil B. Harneworth, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, stated in the House of Commons that the arrests were justified, and were necessitated by the discovery of a plot to start a revolution in Constantinople, beginning with the assassination of Gen. Harrington. Many of those involved were Russians.

JAPANESE PROPOSE PACT ON SHANTUNG

There is some question regarding the attendance of Dr. W. W. Yen, Minister of Foreign Affairs, at the Washington conference. Whether he will go to the United States is said to depend upon the permanency of the present Chinese Cabinet, relative to which there is a growing doubt. Newspapers here are including freely in reports that Premier Chin Yui-peng has decided to resign because of the muddled financial and political state of the country.

Dr. John C. Ferguson, who has been acting as counselor for the Ministry of Communications here, will leave soon for Washington, where he will be adviser to the Chinese delegation.

CABINET IN HURRY, SAYS OPPONENT

By the Associated Press. TOKYO, Sept. 12.—Viscount Kato, who was Foreign Minister when Japan's twenty-one demands were formulated, declared to-day that Japan's latest overtures for the restoration of Kiaochow favored of anxiety to settle the Shantung problem prior to the Washington conference by offering as lenient terms as possible, through fear of intervention by a third party.

The cabinet's attitude on Shantung, said Viscount Kato, "is a silent but eloquent confession of diplomatic incompetency."

The Ministry of Finance has decided to send officials to the Washington conference on Far Eastern questions and the limitation of armaments in view of the close connection between armaments and financial problems.

The delegates, as informally announced, will include Akira Den, Financial Commissioner in the United States; Koro Mori, Financial Commissioner in England and France; Zembel Horikiri, Secretary to the Minister of Finance; Fretau Kawada, Chief of the budget section of the Ministry, and Juiji Tashima, Counselor to the Ministry.

WAR WITH AMERICA POSSIBLE, ULSTER LEADS

Diminution of Rights Leads to Conflict, Belfast Holds.

By the Associated Press. BELFAST, Sept. 12.—Warning to the British Government against circumscribing the powers of the new Ulster Parliament was given by Hugh O'Neill, Speaker of the Parliament in a address at Ballymena, county Antrim, yesterday.

"Any diminution of the rights and privileges of the new Ulster Parliament as a result of the projected negotiations between members of the British Cabinet and the Sinn Fein," he declared, "would lead to a bitter civil war in Ireland."

Such a war, between north and south Ireland, the horrors and misery of which we do not like to contemplate. The calamity, as Prime Minister Lloyd George has truly said, would not be confined to Ireland.

"The war would become worldwide," he continued. "Hundreds of thousands of people from Great Britain and the Empire would support the point of view held in northern Ireland, and there would be hundreds of thousands of people from the United States, and possibly from the British colonies and dependencies, who would come to the aid of southern Ireland. In brief, there would be in Ireland a war which would engulf Great Britain and the United States and would spread horror over the earth."

Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, returned to Belfast this forenoon and presided at a meeting of the cabinet. The Ulster Parliament will open its session on September 20, the date being the same as that set for the proposed Irish peace conference at Inverness.

TO SERVE AT PARLEY

Will Accept Appointment to Arms Conference as Soon as He Is Notified.

BEYOND PARTY POLITICS

Senator Says U. S. Delegation Will Stand as a Unit on All Questions.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 12.—Senator Underwood, the Democratic leader, who has been selected by President Harding as one of the four American delegates to the conference on limitation of armament and Far Eastern questions, at Washington, said here to-day that he would formally accept the appointment as soon as he had received the official notification.

He has been on a vacation in the mountains of Tennessee during the Congressional recess.

There should not and cannot be any party politics at the conference, Senator Underwood said.

"Party politics," he continued, "should only affect domestic questions. When one crosses the three mile limit going out to sea, then the question becomes an international one."

The Democratic leader asserted it was his belief that the nations at the conference would be willing to make the necessary concessions for an ultimate agreement which would relieve the world of its armament burdens and assure peace to "this and future generations."

"I think the four men representing the United States at the conference can stand as a unit on all questions," he said. "The delegation will undoubtedly favor disarmament to an extent that will be real in its effect."

"The problem that confronts us will be to convince the representatives of other nations of the necessity, advisement and effectiveness of the disarmament agreement. Theoretically none of the great nations of the world to-day stand antagonistic to peace, and all would agree theoretically that it is a wise and proper thing to do to reduce the armaments of the world."

ONE DROWNING; 40 RESCUES.

Roughest Ocean of Year Keeps Life Guards Busy.

ATLANTIC CITY, Sept. 12.—A bathor identified as W. R. Jenkins, a retired feed merchant of Schemevus, N. Y., lost his life in the ocean here to-day. Jenkins was seen by life guards struggling in the water, but before they could reach him he sank. Later the body was recovered. Jenkins had been here with his wife.

The beach guards rescued R. J. Baucoff of Watervliet, N. Y., who was swimming near Jenkins. The sea was the roughest of the year and nearly two score bathers were rescued by guards during the day.

GERMAN TREATY RECEIVED.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—One of the two copies of the treaty of peace signed between the United States and Germany at Berlin August 25 was received to-day at the State Department. It was brought to America by Hugh R. Wilson, secretary of the American commission to Germany. The treaty is printed in English and German in the usual form of parallel texts.

A copy of the treaty with Austria also was received during the day.

RETIRED SOLDIER, 100, GREETED BY HARDING

President Felicitates Seatmate at Meeting.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Sept. 12.—John T. Gibson, retired from the army, who will celebrate on next Saturday the one hundredth anniversary of his birth, yesterday received a congratulatory message from President Harding. It said:

"I do remember very well the old gentleman who sat next to me at the Huntington meeting last autumn and am delighted to greet you again. I have to congratulate you on having lived a full century, the most eventful, I am sure, in the world's history, and I hope you will have many more years vouchsafed to you in what I believe will be a yet more important and fruitful time."

The centenarian also has received messages from Admiral Sims and Gov. Allen of Kansas.

HERRICK GOES TO COBLENZ.

PARIS, Sept. 12.—Myron T. Herrick, the American Ambassador here, and Lieut. Col. Mott, Military Attache to the American Embassy, left Paris to-day for Coblenz, where Mr. Herrick will be the guest of Brig.-Gen. Allen, commander of the American forces on the Rhine. While in Coblenz the Ambassador will review the American troops.
