**HARDING SAYS HE FAVORS POSTMASTERS IN POLITICS**

'Td Rather Have a Hard Boiled Democrat Than a Yellow Republican,' President Tells Postal Officials in Washington Convention.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Confidence French Loan.... 5 Option 1934 47 48 that America will be able in the reconstruction period to imbue the other nations of the earth with a spirit of service and understanding was expressed by President Harding to-night in an address before several thousand postmasters and postal employees who have been in convention here.

Without referring directly to the coming armament conference, the President declared his conviction that "the gospel of understanding would be responsible for whatever lasting good may be accomplished in the years of rehabilitation and readjustment ahead."

"Whatever I may have learned to-night," the President said, "I know about postmasters long before I came to the Presidency. I used to help pick them in the good old days, and I'm not sure but I named more of them twenty years ago than I do to-day."

"This particular car, No. 109, that number does not attach to the private car of the Mayor. It attaches to what I might call the Dr. Harris car, and is used by Police Commissioner Enright. That is the fact."

**Question of Police Report.**

"Mr. Chairman, Mr. Carswell is in error. I have here the Police Department report," Mr. Wallstein said.

"Have you got the original service card that is on file in the Police Department that carries the history of each car as it goes in and out?" Carswell asked.

"That I haven't here, but I do have here this document produced by the Police Department."

"That is a copy and not an original. Produce the originals and let them speak for themselves," Carswell said.

**KILLED HUSBAND; TO ASYLUM.**

Insane Woman Sent to Matteawan for Deed on Parole.

Mrs. Mary W. Tomlinson, a former inmate of the Poughkeepsie asylum, who killed her husband, Albert Tomlinson, a mechanical engineer of St. Mary's street, Yonkers, on October 3, was to-day transferred from the White Plains jail to the State Asylum for Insane Criminals at Matteawan under the commitment of County Judge Frank L. Young of White Plains. Mrs. Tomlinson soon after her parole from Poughkeepsie crushed the skull of her husband with a hammer while he was asleep.

While being taken to the asylum to-day Mrs. Tomlinson simply said: "I am glad he is dead. Now I can have a good rest."

**RABBI IS REPROVED FOR CURRAN ATTACK**

Nominee Denounces Bringing Politics Into Pulpit to Aid Hylan Crowd.

Attempts of Rabbi Samuel Buchler, Deputy Commissioner of Markets in the Hylan administration, to drag his religion into politics by declaring in a Day of Atonement sermon that Henry Ford was trying to elect Henry H. Curran as Mayor had a quick reaction yesterday when he was severely criticized by the candidate and Rabbi Stephen Wise.

"My opponents have told me that the campaign would be a dirty one," said Mayor Curran. "That is just what it is when Mayor Hylan's appointee stoops so low as to drag religion into politics. Commissioner Buchler's falsehood is an insult to every man and woman of religious faith in New York city."

Rabbi Wise, who is head of the Free Synagogue, issued this statement: "If Rabbi Buchler made this statement—and I most earnestly trust for his own sake that he did not—he has committed a crime against the Jews of New York and all America. To drag the name of Henry Ford into the present municipal election and to attempt to make it appear that Curran is in any way or manner connected with the Ford anti-Jewish propaganda would be a dastardly thing. It is incredible that Rabbi Buchler, even though a member of the present administration, should have stooped to the use of such weapons against the Curran candidacy. So much for Rabbi Buchler and Henry Ford, with whose plans Rabbi Buchler, if correctly quoted, seems to be familiar."

"Every one who knows Mayor Curran, whether he is to vote for him or not, knows that Curran is a man who is incapable of religious prejudice or racial animosity. Mayor Curran fought with and by the side of the Jewish boys in France, and he respects and honors them as his brave fellow Americans."

**'D. I. ALLEN, NEW YORK,' DIES OF BULLET WOUND**

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 13.—A man who has registered at the Hotel Plaza here as "D. I. Allen, New York," died to-night in the City Hospital, after having been unconscious since he was found three days ago with a bullet wound in his abdomen. Nothing further has been learned of his identity.

County Physician Foulmer told the police that in his opinion the wound was inflicted in an effort to commit suicide. The hotel managers said that the man had been there about three weeks. He gave no information concerning himself, but he is known to have telephoned to a "Mr. Mason" at the Hotel Commodore in New York.

Three "Mr. Masons" are stopping at the Hotel Commodore. Two of them could not be seen last night, but the third said he had never heard of Allen.
