

**McANENY DISCUSSES  
UNTERMYER'S PLAN**

Transit Chief Sees Bar to City  
Lending Credit to Private  
Company.

**FULLER COMMENT SOON**

Estimate Board Again Halts  
Plan to Resurface Top of  
Eastern Parkway Tube.

George McAneny, chairman of the Transit Commission, issued a statement yesterday saying that the commission welcomed "constructive criticism," such as that of Samuel Untermyer in his address at the City Club, but that the main point of Mr. Untermyer's suggested modification of the commission's plan is "open to serious constitutional objection."

It is understood that the commission intends to make a fuller statement early next week in reply to criticisms by Mr. Untermyer, Comptroller Charles L. Craig and others.

Mr. McAneny's statement continues: "Referring to Mr. Untermyer's basic point as to whether the return upon the actual value of the transit properties should be guaranteed by the rate of fare based upon actual cost of service rendered or whether, in the alternative, any possible deficit should be borne by the city through taxation, it may not be amiss to point out at this time that, even if the latter proposal were economically sound and would meet general public approval, it would still be open to serious constitutional objection."

"Section 10 of Article VIII. of the Constitution provides:

"No county, city, town or village shall hereafter give any money or property, or loan its money or credit to, or in aid of, any individual, association or corporation, or become directly or indirectly, the owner of stock in, or bonds of, any association or corporation; nor shall any such county, city, town or village be allowed to incur any indebtedness, except for county, city, town or village purposes."

"While provision for transit is a city purpose, it seems clear that the city is prohibited from guaranteeing interest upon the securities that the proposed consolidated company would issue in payment for the properties to be acquired."

"Incidentally, this same provision would prohibit the city from taking or holding bonds of the consolidated company as representing its investment in the subway."

"The main consideration in this connection would seem to be to make the city's investment self-sustaining and to release it from the debt limit for the building of additional subways and other necessary municipal purposes. It may well be that any new investment by the city should be given a prior lien. This suggestion, together with all others, will receive thorough consideration."

"The Board of Estimate again postponed action upon the request of the Transit Commission for funds to restore the street and park surface torn up in constructing the Eastern Parkway subway in Brooklyn."

Grover Whalen, Commissioner of Plant and Structures, was authorized to establish a bus line in The Bronx, from Prospect Avenue and 148th Street to Fordham Road, and another line between Flushing and Jamaica, in Queens.

**CORNERSTONE ROBBED  
OF COINS AND PAPERS**

Patient Thief Does Neat Job  
at Spring Valley.

There are all kinds of easy things to steal from apples to automobiles, but the thief whose operation was disclosed in Rockland county yesterday disdained both the easy and the obvious. He chiselled open the cornerstone of the Spring Valley High School to steal the coins placed there when the stone was laid. Having got the coins he went to work with fresh cement and neatly filled the hole. And being nothing if not a tidy workman, he swept up the chunks of stone and mortar and carried them off with the money.

The stone, set with no end of ceremony in 1916, is below the street level. The janitor, Hand Womer, found minute pieces of cement on the basement floor and followed this clue to the corner-stone. The robber had penetrated to the copper box at the heart of the stone, and taken not only between \$3 and \$5 in silver coins, mintage of 1915, thrown into the box by the school children on laying day, but the records and newspapers without which no cornerstone is sanctified. The janitor discovered fragments of these records outside one of the schoolhouse doors.

**GIRL FOR LOSS OF LEGS  
GETS \$30,000 VERDICT**

Irving Kiffin Awarded \$17,000 in Suing E. C. Striffler.

Lois Kiffin, 10 years old, was awarded a verdict of \$30,000 in the Bergen County Circuit Court at Hackensack yesterday in a suit for damages brought by her father in her behalf against E. C. Striffler of New York and Harrington Park, N. J. Her father, Irving Kiffin, was awarded \$17,000. The jury which handed down both verdicts was composed of six women and six men, and the amounts were the largest ever awarded in a personal injury damage suit in Bergen county.

The testimony at the trial showed that the girl will always be a cripple, both of her legs having been broken in several places a year ago last August, when she was struck by Striffler's automobile near her home in Tenafly. Her father testified that he had spent more than \$15,000 for surgical aid for the child.

**HELD IN FATAL EXPLOSION.**  
Joseph Harris, of South River, N. J., contractor for the removal of junk from the power plant of the E. L. du Pont de Nemours Company at Parlin, N. J., was arraigned yesterday in the County Court at New Brunswick on a charge of manslaughter. He was charged with ordering workmen to hammer an iron pipe to dislodge a piece of gun cotton which had been stuffed in the pipe. An explosion resulted, which killed six men. The accident occurred two weeks ago. Harris was admitted to \$3,000 bail to await Grand Jury action.
