GILROY BEGINS WITH CHINESE MEETING

Then Invades Stronghold of Hulbert's Chief Aid in the Campaign for Fusion.

'HONEST' MAYOR' CRY JOKE

Bronx Voters Hear Candidate's Position on Schools, Taxes, Rents and Car Fares.

Choosing Mayor Hylan's school record as the most vulnerable spot in the armor of the present administration, Vincent Gilroy, coalition candidate for President of the Board of Aldermen, addressed four crowded meetings last night.

Although he devoted much time to the fact that 317,377 children, more than one-third of the entire registration, are either on part time or in the double ended system, he betrays not neglect other phases of the administration's activities.

Mr. Gilroy started his busy evening at a Chinese dinner at the City Hall Chinese restaurant in Park Row. From there, after making a brief address, he turned to his first regular meeting at the German-American Voters League.

He declared that the crooked politicians who are behind Hylan have raised the cry of "The Honest Mayor" to conceal their own work, but he said that he did not believe the people of the Bronx could be deceived.

He referred to the market graft testimony before the Meyer committee and observed that a Tammany district captain named Winters was mentioned by the witnesses.

From this meeting Mr. Gilroy hurried to Hunt's Point Palace, Southern Boulevard and 163d street. There he pointed out that money is being spent in celebrating the opening just before election of a few new schools when the money should be devoted to school purposes.

Another part of the Hylan campaign, he said, was "visiting week" for the schools. Teachers, he declared, were advised to take some of the classes out for a walk so that the schools would not appear so crowded when the parents inspected them.

"When your rents are raised in the Bronx," he said, "bear in mind the fact that this is so because of the high tax rate of the present administration, and bear in mind the further fact that although you pay so much to your Government you are not getting the proper return, especially in the matter of schools."

"Hylan talks a lot about the five cent fare, although you people are paying more than a five cent fare now, and in many places your transfers were discontinued by Lewis Nixon, the Tammany man who was Public Service Commissioner. I have asked that a three cent rate of fare be established for the school children who are compelled to ride to their schools because of overcrowded conditions, and I shall make a fight for this three cent fare before the Transit Commission."

MAJOR DEMAREST REGAINS HIS POST

Despite the protest of Mayor Hylan two weeks ago that "this man is out and he'll stay out," the Board of Estimate's committee on finance and budget yesterday restored Major Charles S. Demarest to his post as chief of construction of the Fire Department, from which he retired on half pay to serve with the American Expeditionary Forces in France.

When it became apparent that the remainder of the committee would vote for reinstatement Mayor Hylan withdrew his objections.

FAUROT SAYS SWANN LACKS IN VIGILANCE

Deputy Commissioner Supports Clark in His Criticism of Prosecutor.

The contention of John Kirkland Clark, coalition candidate for District Attorney, that the prevalence of crime in this county is due to lack of vigilance on the part of District Attorney Swann and his staff, was repeated from an unexpected quarter yesterday when Deputy Police Commissioner Joseph A. Faurot, as the spokesman for Commissioner Enright, declared that if the police had the cooperation of the District Attorney's office there was no criminal situation possible in New York which could not be met.

Mr. Faurot appeared as the representative of Commissioner Enright before the Yorkville Chamber of Commerce, where Mr. Enright had been invited to discuss police matters. He began his talk with the statement that this was the best policed city in the world and ended it by insisting that the police could not keep it law abiding all by themselves.

"Professional thieves," he complained, "are released on bail as often as six or seven times and continue their criminal operations unhindered as a result. Bail should be refused the second time to a man known to be a professional burglar, and the man should be kept imprisoned until convicted or acquitted."

Mr. Clark launched a second broadside at Mr. Swann yesterday in a statement in which he charged that criminals who preyed upon the public during the years of prosperity immediately preceding the present depression and got away with it, have been allowed to escape with their loot owing to the lack of vigilance of the bureau of commercial frauds of the District Attorney's office under Tammany administration.

"In its inception," the statement set forth, "the bureau was a noteworthy idea. Mr. Swann created it and at the outset it won commendation from many civic and mercantile organizations. But it later dragged his office more deeply into the morass of rotten administration and finally was abolished when Joab H. Banton became chief of staff in name but District Attorney in fact in January of this year."

Mr. Clark's statement followed a reply by Mr. Swann to the statement issued by Mr. Clark on Sunday.

"Mr. Clark," Mr. Swann wrote in part, "recklessly criticizes the prosecution of homicide cases, notwithstanding the fact that ever since I have been in office the prosecution of capital cases has been in the hands of those who were Mr. Clark's associates here under Gov. Whitman. Had Mr. Clark displayed half the ability of Mr. Brothman he would have been invited by me to remain."

"Mr. Clark must stand or fall on his own record in this office and not parade himself in borrowed plumage."

COALITION BUDGET FINANCING BEGINS

Drive On for Money to Run Campaign Along Modest Lines.

MEETINGS ARE ARRANGED

Committee of 200 Citizens Selected to Press Curran Candidacy.

Plans for financing the coalition campaign were made yesterday at a meeting in the Murray Hill Hotel. Budgets for the various activities have been cut to the bone, but so far the treasury is bare, and an active drive to secure enough money to run a campaign on modest lines financially will start at once.

Supreme Court Justice James C. Crosey has actively entered the campaign. His principal speech will be made at Kismet Temple, Brooklyn, on November 2.

Beginning to-day there will be daily noonday meetings at 822 Broadway under the joint auspices of the National Republican Club and the Young Republican Club. All the candidates on the city ticket and Charles D. Hillis will speak to-day. Benjamin F. Day will preside.

The monthly meeting of the Republican County Committee, at Bryant Hall, on October 29, will be addressed by the coalition candidates.
