

HYLAN SAYS CURRAN AIDS TRACTION RING

Mayor Again Attacks Untermyer and Turns Guns on Lawyer, Jerome.

Mayor John F. Hylan made speeches in Brooklyn and Queens last night, touring the boroughs with Comptroller Charles L. Craig and Murray Hubert, Democratic candidates for Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen, and told his audiences that at last he was able to expose Henry H. Curran, the coalition candidate for Mayor, as "exactly what he is."

"The mask is off the candidacy of Henry Curran," said Mr. Hylan, "and he stands revealed as the tool of the traction ring. He is in the same category with Interborough-Metropolitan Untermyer and William Traction Jerome. Curran is getting a campaign fund of hundreds of thousands of dollars to help him try to grasp the Mayorship. Jerome is getting \$2,000 a night to continue the venal prostitution which he began when he was District Attorney years ago, in behalf of the traction ring. Untermyer comes the highest of all, because he knows the value of the political office he renders as a traction attorney.

"The issue in the campaign is so clear that no human being can fail to understand it. It is the traction ring and higher fares against the people and a 5 cent fare. It is this traction issue that the traction candidates and the traction press have tried their hardest to dodge. They tried to criticize the Police Department and they tried to make an issue of the schools. They failed. They failed in this because the parents of the children could not be deceived. They tried to reflect on the Dock Department, and they learned that the city was getting three times as much revenue out of the piers built under my administration than under previous administrations. They have failed in every step to blanket the traction issue."

Mr. Hylan devoted a large part of his speech to another talk on Mr. Untermyer, similar to the one of the night before, and with almost precisely the same material, although he presented letters which he declared stamped Mr. Untermyer as the tool of the traction ring, and the man who had saved the "traction interests" from paying for their financial sins.

"Curran," Mr. Hylan said, "is only a weak tool of the traction ring. He wants to be Mayor, and in order to get the financial support of the interests he will do just as they tell him to."

Mr. Hylan's first speech yesterday was before the Commerce Club, 750 Washington avenue, Brooklyn, in the afternoon. Last night he spoke in Public School 6, in the Exempt Firemen's Hall, Public School 20, Public School 21, Public School 22 and Areeda Hall.

HYLAN ODDS FIRM AT 4 TO 1.

Even Money Offered He Will Carry City by 150,000.

Odds on Hylan to defeat Major Curran at the election on Tuesday remained at 4 to 1 yesterday. W. L. Darnell & Co. and James W. Ball & Co. both reported they had plenty of Hylan money to lay at that figure.

Considerable betting was done on even terms early in the day that Hylan will win by 150,000, and at the close of business Darnell & Co. were offering \$25,000 on that his plurality will be 150,000.

UNTERMYER 'IS FOE' OF TRANSIT GROUP

He Repudiates the Mayor's Charges of a Friendly Alignment.

Samuel Untermyer, in a statement issued last night in answer to Mayor Hylan's accusations of alignment with the transit group, replied in detail to the Mayor's charges, and ended by submitting a set of questions which he asks the Mayor to answer, "if he knows how to make a straight answer to any question."

Mr. Untermyer insists he has always been persona non grata with the traction companies, and that his hostility toward them has been open and continuous.

"And yet I am not surprised," he states, "that the man who went on the witness stand and solemnly swore he did not know Hettrick, with whom he had had repeated conversations and correspondence; who insisted he did not know Goss; who denied the sworn testimony of Shonta as to the 7 cent fare, but who made no denial until after Shonta was dead; who says he 'fired' Bugher; who has the audacity to tell the people of this city that he is responsible for the rent laws, the housing reforms and the test of the constitutionality of the laws, with which he had not the slightest connection; the man who has impeding housing relief by his Brindell and Goss appointments on the

housing committee; the man who invaded the pulpit to electioneer and who has uttered more falsehoods to the square inch than all the candidates put together in the history of the city, should have the temerity to class me among the traction men in the face of my long and consistent record."

Mr. Untermyer quotes abstracts from correspondence between himself and Mayor Hylan during the early part of 1919. "During all that time," he states, "I had been urging and warning the Mayor to do something to protect the interests of the people of the city against the elimination of transfers that had then already begun, and in order to preserve the five cent fare; in trying to prevent the situation that now confronts us, thanks to his inaction."
