

BLWUP HURTING 11 CREDITED TO STILL

Baby Watching Father's Kitchen Operations May Die From Injuries.

SEVEN FIREMEN HURT

Two Explosions 15 Minutes Apart Come From Mysterious Containers on Stove.

APPARATUS IS FOUND

Copper Coils and Tanks of Various Sizes Lead Police to Investigate.

Two explosions, fifteen minutes apart, on the top floor of the three story buildings at the northeast corner of Hudson and West Eleventh street, last night caused injuries to eleven persons, seven of them firemen. One fireman and a six-months-old baby, son of Richard Cargullo, grocery importer, in whose home the explosions occurred, were taken to St. Vincent's Hospital. It was said the child probably was fatally injured.

Police and firemen remained on guard in the room that was wrecked by the blasts and Fire Marshal Thomas F. Brophy was asked to investigate. The police said they believed a still had burst.

The injured included Cargullo, whose hands and face were badly burned; his wife, Mrs. Rose Cargullo, whose hair was burned off; Virginia, 8 years old, his daughter; Francisco, the baby, and the seven firemen—Capt. Michael Selinger, Lieut. Frederick Trefcer, Joseph Donohue, Anthony Burke, Charles Jastinsky, John Daly and Thomas Ward—all of Truck Company 5. Burke was taken to St. Vincent's, but the other firemen were able to return to their quarters. Cargullo, his wife and their daughter were given first aid and left at the home of a neighbor.

Cargullo, his wife and daughter told the police, was in the kitchen "cooking something," with the baby looking on, when the entire apartment suddenly was illuminated by a burst of flame. The next instant there was a resounding crash and most of the kitchen utensils, with the baby and his high chair, were flung out into the dining room. Mrs. Cargullo and the girl gathered up the baby, smothered the fire in his dress and ran to the street. A policeman who heard their shouts ran into the house and pulled Cargullo into the hallway. Meanwhile passersby had sent in an alarm, and Truck Company 5 reached

the house in a few minutes. Capt. Selinger and Lieut. Trefcer led a crew of men to the Cargullo home. They working with chemical extinguishers and had the fire almost under control when a stream of chemical mixture struck a big milk can that was balanced precariously on top of a gas stove. A cloud of steam arose, and in the excitement some one knocked the can over. Its contents took fire, and the liquid spilled out over the stove and the floor in a broad stream of fire. Some vapor remaining in the can exploded, blowing most of the men in the room into the hallway.

Two of the crew of Engine Company 18 led by Battalion Chief George Bower were raising a scaling ladder up the side of the house when the second blast took place. Firemen John D. Collinger and James Egan were with Chief Bower on the ledge of the window of the Cargullo kitchen. They were able to help Donohue, Burke, Jastinsky and Daley to the street and probably saved Burke's life. He was hanging over the window sill when they reached him and his clothing was in flames.

An examination of the room where the fire was found resulted in the discovery, according to the police, of two forty-gallon milk cans with tightfitting tops, four five-gallon cans, a big ash can and a length of copper tubing that looked as if it were once a coil.

CRIME RECORD BARED.

Alleged Guiltive Deported From Canada.

BUFFALO, Nov. 19.—James Hall of Houston, Tex., alleged murderer and fugitive from justice, is being held here to-day for extradition papers from Texas.

Hall's alleged crimes were committed during the world war. He fled to Canada and joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Returning to Toronto after discharge, he married and was living an exemplary life when his Texas record became known to the police. He left a wife and two children when the authorities sent him to the border under a deportation order. Buffalo police arrested him at the American end of the International bridge.

TRAIN KILLS THREE.

WILMINGTON, Mass., Nov. 19.—The bodies of Mrs. Henry Gamme and her two children, one a girl of 12 and the other a boy of 4, were found beside the Boston and Maine Railroad tracks near the North Wilmington station to-day. They apparently had been struck by a train while walking through a deep cut during the fog.
