

BONES ARE SHOWN TO 'BLUEBEARD' JURY

Not Human, Defence Contends as It Scores in Intimating a Plant.

LANDRU WITTY IN REPLY

'What's Your Method of Executing—Firearms, Poison Or Strangling?' Asks Judge.

VERSAILLES, Nov. 23 (Associated Press).—The defence in the trial of Henri Landru was considered by those present in court to-day to have had its best day since the trial opened. This belief was based on the fact that the defence proved by witnesses for the prosecution that Landru's villa at Gambais, where the eleven murders are alleged to have been committed, remained unprotected between April 15, the date of the first search of the premises, at which time nothing but the bodies of two dogs were found, and April 25, three days prior to the second search, when there were discovered a pound and a half of bones which the prosecution avers belonged to human beings.

the first question put to him to-day by Judge Gilbert. "What has been your method of executing your victims—by firearms, poison or strangling?" was the question fired point blank at the prisoner at the opening of the session.

Judge Gilbert admitted that the prosecution could consider all three hypotheses, recognizing that in the nature of the case it was unable to establish any one of them by absolute proof.

"It would be much simpler to make the hypothesis that I killed none at all," responded Landru.

The prosecution undertook, although unable to establish the method of killing, to prove that the alleged victims were cremated. Pointing to the small stove placed in the centre of the court room, the prisoner shouted derisively:

"Why, you couldn't cremate a chicken in it."

The prosecution charges that the "Bluebeard" used the stove to cremate his alleged victims after he had chopped them into bits.

Landru soon recovered his composure when the prosecution admitted that it was unable to prove the manner in which the prisoner's alleged victims had vanished. It was said that death might have resulted from poison administered by Landru, as a book entitled "The World's Famous Poisoners" had been found in the villa.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The special Senate committee investigating American occupation of Haiti and the Dominican republic started to-day for Philadelphia, where they will board the army transport Argonne for Port au Prince.

At the last moment a change was made in the personnel. Senator King, Democrat (Utah), being detained in Washington by other duties, tendered his resignation as a member, and Senator Jones, Democrat (N. M.), was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The other members of the committee are Chairman McCormick (Ill.) and Senator Odell (Nev.), Republicans, and Pomoren (Ohio), Democrat. The committee will be away from Washington about a month.

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 23 (Associated Press).—British Minister Macleay and Francis White, American Charge d'Affaires, have appealed to the Argentine Government to take measures for the protection of British subjects and American citizens in the Patagonian territory of Santa Cruz against the violence of large forces of brigands led by agitators of the Soviet type.

In addition to the reported kidnapping of a manager for Armour & Co. by the name of MacBey, near the town of Santa Cruz, rumors are current that other Americans have been taken prisoner by the bandits. Minister Macleay has received urgent appeals from British owners near the towns of Santa Cruz and Rio Gallegos, reporting that the bandits had kidnapped several British subjects, and that life and property were unsafe.

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 23.—The diplomatic representatives of the United States, Great Britain and several other nations have presented strong objections to the Argentine Government against the enforcement of a decree which the Argentine Immigration authorities purpose to make effective on January 1, requiring that crews of all ships entering Argentine ports be provided with the same credentials as passengers.

Under the terms of the decree, which is intended to prevent the entrance of agitators and other undesirable in the guise of sailors, every sailor arriving in port will have to be provided with police credentials showing good antecedents.

Stiburg during the invasion of West Hungary with the intention of misleading the Entente and duping the allied generals in Hungary, unless the Horthy government abandons all intention of punishing Charles for his effort to regain the throne.
