

PACKING INJUNCTION IS DEFIED BY UNIONS

Kansas Court of Industrial Relations Orders Work to Continue.

AUTHORITY COMBATED

Employees Cite Plea Ignored by Judicial Body Last Year.

SAY 3,000 WERE LAID OFF

Pickets Walk Kansas City Streets Exhorting Witnesses to Ignore Summonses.

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Dec. 3.—The Kansas Court of Industrial Relations today issued a temporary restraining order to packers and union officials in Kansas City, Kan., to "continue the present status, terms and conditions of employment."

The order, according to Richard J. Hopkins, Attorney-General of Kansas, constitutes a virtual injunction against the strike called for Monday.

Evidence of the determination of the packing unions to strike and disregard the mandate of the Industrial Court was manifested this afternoon in an order to the union workmen here to take their tools home when they quit work.

Pickets from the packing unions chal-

lenged the authority of the Industrial Court. They walked the street in front of the City Hall at the morning meeting, exhorting witnesses subpoenaed by the court not to acknowledge the summonses. They worked quietly, but now and then stopped to explain their purpose in picketing the session of the court.

At the outset of the hearing representatives of the three packing concerns, Swift & Co., Morris & Co., and Wilson & Co., raised the question of the court's jurisdiction.

In ignoring the court investigation the labor leaders made a further claim for their position to-day in that they appealed to the court in February, 1920, asking that the court intervene when the packers were laying off men.

In one week, they maintain, the packers laid off 3,000 men. The court sent a survey of the situation, but no action came from his report.

MEAT CUTTERS' UNION DEFIES KANSAS COURT

Officials Call Order Against Packers Strike a Joke.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—National officers of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America today directed their followers in Kansas City, Kan., to respond to the general strike call Monday in defiance of a contrary order issued by the Kansas Court of Industrial Relations.

"The Kansas Industrial Court is a joke to us," said Dennis Lane, secretary of the union. "We have sent special instructions to go ahead with the strike in Kansas."

Coincident with an order from Armour & Co. that all employees who walk out Monday in protest against the 10 per cent wage reduction will lose their places, advertisements appeared in the newspapers to-day calling for men to fill any vacancies.

In Chicago, while union men remained steadfast in their strike plans, the packers called on Chief of Police Fitzmorris to prepare against possible violence. He has made arrangements to police the yards.

Officers of the "Big Five" packers have made plain their intention to continue operations, and declared they do not fear a walkout on a large scale. Union leaders say there are 35,000 union men in the plants distributed throughout fifteen cities.

DIES IN FALL OFF TRAIN
