

BLIND MEN MOURN ARTHUR PEARSON

Thousand Walk at Funeral in Line, Fingers Touching Each Others' Backs.

TWO SERVICES IN LONDON

Concourse From All Parts of British Isles Pays Tribute at Grave.

The presence of more than a thousand blind men, who had come from all parts of England to pay homage to Sir Arthur Pearson, Bart., together with a great number of others, including scores of prominent persons, made his funeral to-day one of the most notable ever seen in this city.

The long line of blind men, escorted by 200 guardsmen, walked in the procession with their fingers touching each other's backs, and with their courage in paying tribute to the man whose motto was "victory over blindness" they proved a living testimonial of what his doctrine accomplished.

The ranks included hundreds of blinded ex-soldiers of Dunstan's Home, which Sir Arthur founded. At the grave their strong and fearless voices joined in that hymn particularly fitting to the memory of their patron: Lead kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom, Lead thou me on!

The coffin was preceded by a boy scout carrying a wreath in the form of a Union Jack, the staff of which was supported by a dove and bearing the device "V. O. B." meaning victory over blindness. The number of floral tributes was so vast that florists said their resources had not been so heavily taxed since the funeral of the late King Edward VII.

The blind men flocked in from all parts of the British Isles last night, the Government assisting them to houses near St. Dunstan's Home which were specially prepared for them. Many brought wreaths and bouquets, and there were many pathetic reunions of men who, having fought side by side in the war, now recognized each other by their voices.

ANDRASSY AND SIGRAY NOW ILL TREATED IN HUNGARY

Political Leaders Who Favored Restoration of Emperor Charles Dealt With Severely in Prison and Can See Relatives Only Once a Week.

Budapest, Dec. 13.—Despite the law excluding the Hapsburg family from the throne of Hungary, the Carlist party still is very active and has not abandoned its attempt to restore the exiled King, contending that Admiral Horthy, the Regent, has not acted fairly in this connection, and that the de-thronement law is in force only because it was enacted and promulgated under pressure of the Allies and the little Entente (Rumania, Czecho-Slovakia and Jugoslavia).

Count Andrassy, Count Auton Sigray and other leaders who sided with Carli and were made prisoners are now treated rather severely, although at first they were treated leniently. Now only their nearest relatives are permitted to see them once a week, and they are allowed only short walks in the prison yard.

J. M. CURLEY CHOSEN MAYOR OF BOSTON

Elected in Closest Mayoralty Contest in City's History.

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—Former Mayor James M. Curley was elected Mayor of Boston to-day by a plurality of 2,315 votes over John R. Murphy, former Fire Commissioner. In one of the closest mayoralty contests in the history of the city. The other two candidates ran far behind. The vote was: Curley, 73,869; Murphy, 71,554; Charles S. Baxter, 4,243; Charles S. O'Connor, 10,812.

The total vote of 160,478 represented about 77 per cent. of the registration of 207,868. Women voters, of whom 77,998 were registered, turned out in large numbers in spite of a desultory snow-storm.

WORCESTER, Mass., Dec. 13.—Peter F. Sullivan, Democrat, was re-elected Mayor of Worcester to-day, winning over former Alderman Fred A. Minor, Republican, 27,021 to 20,135.

MANCUSO SWORN AS JUDGE.

Francis X. Mancuso, Judge-elect in General Sessions, was sworn in yesterday for fourteen years by Judge McIntyre. He succeeds Judge Morris Koenig on January 1. At the same time Joab Banton, District Attorney-elect, was sworn in by Judge Crain. Mr. Banton, who is Acting District Attorney, succeeds Mr. Swann January 1.

C. W. MORSE IS HELD IN \$50,000 BAIL

Comes Back From Washington After Appearing to Answer Conspiracy Accusation.

Special Dispatch to THE NEW YORK HERALD. New York Herald Bureau, Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.] Charles W. Morse took a train for New York to-night, a few hours after he had been served with a Federal warrant charging conspiracy to defraud the Government, and had been released in \$50,000 bail.

Mr. Morse, accompanied by his counsel, Wilton J. Lambert of Washington, and his two sons, Irwin A. Morse and Henry F. Morse, appeared voluntarily at the office of United States Commissioner Hitt, and there was served with the warrant, issued upon complaint of Frank Hitt, chief operative of the Shipping Board.

A plea of not guilty was entered by Mr. Morse, and Commissioner Hitt fixed his bond, which was furnished promptly. Mr. Morse's appearance before Commissioner Hitt this afternoon occupied only a few minutes. His counsel and bondsmen gave ample assurances that Mr.

Morse would present himself to the court whenever wanted. The warrant served upon Mr. Morse charged conspiracy and embezzlement in connection with an alleged false claim. The warrant alleges that the conspiracy began July 14, 1919.

Mr. Morse later in a public statement made a complete disclaimer of assertions by Government representatives and characterized the charges as being nebulous in character. Mr. Morse's statement said: "I have read as carefully as the time has permitted the charges formulated in the complaint, and will say in regard to them:

"They are so nebulous and false and lack of definite statements it is impossible for me to deny them specifically, but I have no hesitancy in saying that in so far as I have any knowledge there were no false statements made, neither were there any false vouchers presented to the Fleet Corporation by the Virginia Shipbuilding Company.

"Further, the only definite charge made was on the 14th day of July, 1919, a statement made to the full Shipping Board, Emergency Fleet Corporation by the Virginia Corporation through its officers, Mr. C. H. Livingstone, its president; Mr. Martin, its treasurer; Mr. Christy, its auditor, and its counsel, Messrs. Gibbons, Scott & Gordon, at which my son, E. A. Morse, and myself were present, which statement I have no hesitancy in saying was undoubtedly true."

It is not probable that Mr. Morse will be asked to return to Washington for several weeks. In all likelihood he will spend Christmas with his family in New York and not be disturbed by a court summons.
