OPERATORS ACQUIRE FOUR APARTMENTS Zimmer & Resnick Buy 13 Story House at Central Park West and 93d Street.

The Upper West Side, where record breaking apartment house deals have recently been negotiated, furnished another transaction in the seven figure class yesterday when the twelve story Turin Apartments at the north corner of Central Park West and Ninety-third street held at \$1,900,000 was bought by Jeldore Zimmer and Samuel Resnick for \$1,700,000.

It is added, however, that the French Government has been obliged to complain to the German Government about the "discrimination shown against French shipping in German ports, emigration licenses being granted to British sailing vessels flying other flags and refused to French lines." The matter is said to be under discussion by the two Governments.

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BUILDING PROJECTS PLANNED IN BRONX

Apartment House and Business Operations Will Provide Needed Space.

The Harlin Construction Company will erect a six story elevator apartment house on five and one-half lots at the southeast corner of Bedford Park boulevard and Grand Concourse, bought from Mark A. O'Brien & Co.

The Cypress Avenue Realty Corporation, Bernard B. Block, president, purchased the plot, 128x101, at the northeast corner of 128th street and Cypress avenue, upon which it will erect a one story business building, containing a public market and ten stores, half of which have been rented from the plans.

Plans for apartment houses in the Bronx were filed yesterday as follows: 17th street, northeast corner of Townsend avenue, five story, 100.6x88.81. Real Estate Managers, Inc., owners; Frank Begrich, Jr., president; Moore & Landseid, architect, cost, \$300,000.

An advertisement in a New York newspaper finally led Friedman to a younger sister there, and the Shapiro search was ended. Friedman is expected to arrive in Chicago within a few days.

When a large motor truck was disabled early yesterday near the middle of the Brooklyn bridge the eastbound Brooklyn surface car tracks were blocked. In consequence a long string of R. R. T. cars were congested at the Manhattan end of the bridge, unable to proceed to Brooklyn.

Thousands of persons living in Brooklyn were late in getting to their places of business in New York City. The city was in a state of confusion. Many arrived by the elevated trains, operation of which was halted.

T. C. track crews and workmen of the Department of Plant and Structures were engaged for more than half an hour in getting the disabled motor truck off the track to permit the resumption of Brooklyn surface traffic.

CHATEAU THIERRY IN THREE CORNERED DEAL

Properties in Sale Valued at \$500,000.

Henry Goodstein purchased and immediately resold yesterday the Chateau Thierry apartments at the south corner of Riverside Drive and Eighty-fifth street, held at \$300,000.

The seller of the property, which is a six story structure occupying a plot 27.5x96.4x irregular, was Joseph S. Ward, the coal merchant, who bought the parcel last year from Gustave Sandblow, to whom he had sold the house three years before.

After taking the property over from Mr. Ward, Mr. Goodstein disposed of it to Stewart Forsyth of Ferguson, Forsyth & Co., old time builders.

In part payment for the Chateau Thierry, Mr. Goodstein turned over to Mr. Ward the two story building known as the Hargood at the southwest corner of Amsterdam avenue and 125th street, extending through to Myolan place, 32.5 feet.

This property was purchased by Mr. Goodstein two years ago and was extensively altered. It formerly housed the Seventh District Municipal Court and the Mechanics and Motive National Bank now occupies the corner store. It occupies a plot 173.8 feet on 125th street and 193.8 feet on Myolan place, with a rear lot 202.2 feet. Byrne & Bowman were the brokers. The entire deal is said to have involved \$500,000.
