

Crown Prince of Denmark to Wed Grecian Princess

Princess Olga, the Bride Elect, Once Reported Engaged to Mr. William B. Leeds, Jr.

COPENHAGEN, March 4. (Associated Press)—King Christian and Queen Alexandra of Denmark to-day announced the betrothal of Crown Prince Alexander of Denmark to-day and eldest daughter of Prince Nicholas of Greece.

Christian Frederick was born March 31, 1889, and Princess Olga in May, 1903. In 1917 it was reported in Copenhagen, when King Christian was visiting King Gustav of Sweden, that the object of the visit was the discussion of the possible marriage of the Danish Crown Prince and Princess Margaretha, eldest daughter of Prince Charles of Sweden, brother of King George.

Princess Olga might become the bride of Mr. William B. Leeds, Jr., son of the American "oil plate king," whose daughter is Princess Anastasia, wife of Prince Christopher of Greece.

Princess Olga was married in Russia, a niece of King Constantine of Greece, last October. Her betrothal to Crown Prince Christian Frederick was among the passengers of the dirigible Roma in March of last year when the dirigible made a long flight in Italy.

Americans Pay Tribute to Memory of Viscount Bryce

Impressive Services Held at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

The Cathedral of St. John the Divine was crowded yesterday afternoon at the memorial services for Viscount Bryce.

The service was a special one called by Bishop William T. Manning, and was attended by many British, Canadian and Australian officials of state and members of virtually every British and Canadian society in the city.

Three speakers, Bishop Manning, John W. Davis, formerly Ambassador to the Court of St. James's, and Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn, president of the American Museum of Natural History, eulogized the dead statesman and spoke of his untiring efforts toward the furtherance of friendly relations between all of the English speaking nations, especially those of Great Britain and this country.

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The Bishop of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, Bishop William T. Manning, said: "The memory of Viscount Bryce stands highest in the minds of men for his sincerity, his justice and his staunchness in befriending the oppressed, as he did in the case of Armenia. The memory of Viscount Bryce stands as deep in America as in Britain, for we feel that he belonged to us as much as he did to his native land. We think of him as a scholar, statesman and traveler, who stood for the oppressed and the suffering and the oppressed, of his gifts and powers, and of his wide and accurate knowledge. But as remarkable as were his gifts, his character was his chief qualification, his integrity and his unqualified sincerity and integrity of character."

"The greatest desire of his life was to see a further strengthening of the fellowship between America and Great Britain and all the English-speaking people, for the good of the whole world. He helped us to better understand Great Britain and we are thankful for his part in cementing the bonds between the American and British people, both of which he served so well."

One of his most interesting features was a brief resume of the life of Viscount Bryce, and spoke of the earnestness with which the late statesman worked for the unity of spirit of all the English speaking nations.

"He gave to those who knew him the impression of having been everywhere, knowing everybody, and seeing everything. He was a native of Scotland, but he was representative in England ever asked his aid without receiving it in abundance."

Prof. Osborn spoke of Viscount Bryce as a native of Scotland, who traveled in search of facts concerning all of the peoples of the globe. He compared Viscount Bryce and H. G. Wells, saying: "How outstanding his thought as compared to the superficiality of some of the men who are occupying the same paths in history! Picture Wells writing a novel, and he is surrounded by other men, while Lord Bryce was studying the facts at first hand, with a passion for facts, facts, and facts."
