

RAZING LANDMARKS AT YALE CRITICIZED

French Professor Believes University Is Losing Valuable Heritages.

'AMERICA TOO HURRIED'

Thirst for Destruction Torturing Whole Country, Visitor Finds.

NEW HAVEN, March 18.—A criticism of Yale by Prof. Albert Fuciliere of the University of Rennes, France, who spent the first six months of the academic year of 1919-1920 at the university here as an exchange professor, is contained in what he terms his "Impressions of Yale," which is creating considerable discussion among Yale men here.

Prof. Fuciliere deprecates the race for progress at Yale, and points out that in her demolition of old buildings she is destroying one of her most valuable heritages. He intimates, further, that in this race Yale may be forgetting many other things of greater importance. He writes: "In the sharp lines of the buildings there is a youth and vigor which betray a false appearance of age, and I was therefore not surprised to learn from my guide that, except for Connecticut Hall, which dates back to 1750, all the buildings are modern."

"The thirst for destruction which tortures this country is impossible to satiate; progress calls for it. It is difficult to resist this eternal pursuit for the new, for if you attempt to moderate it in any way you are taken for an enemy to progress! A university like Yale, where traditions are maintained with much respect and which so sincerely tries to safeguard the culture of the past, is forced as quickly as anywhere else to give way to this movement, which is leading the whole country along a giddy path that is marked only by perpetual new beginnings."

"For proof of this all I have to do is to step across the High Street, where a dormitory, the Memorial Quadrangle, which will accommodate 600 students, is just springing forth from the ground. It will be a magnificent piece of work, but it has been necessary to do away with Pierson Hall and the Peabody Institute, which were, too, witnesses of the honored days which Yale bears toward her benefactors and her illustrious sons."

"Thus the desire of forever surpassing one's self has always resulted. And under these ruins have been forever buried the hallowed memories which would have allowed future generations to strengthen by means of them the respect for those who have gone before, and thus to satisfy one of the most fundamental instincts of a cultured man."

"I cannot help thinking that there is something pathetic in the spectacle of this university, which is making an effort to create traditions for itself, but which sees that it is compelled to keep up with the times, to destroy indiscriminately the witnesses of its past. "To do things fast, to succeed fast, or to do things slow, to succeed slow, these are the words that one often hears coming from the mouths of these young people here. If one listens to those who are craving for money, technical and professional schools will soon be the only ones necessary for a man's education."

DRAGGED FROM TAXICAB AND BEATEN, SAYS GIRL

Attacked by Four Negroes in Central Park West.

A well-dressed young woman who said she was Miss Eleanor Byrnes, a telephone operator, of 224 West Sixty-third street, entered the West Forty-seventh street station early yesterday to report

that a taxicab in which she was returning home from a St. Patrick's day party was stopped at 197th street and Central Park West by four negroes in a large touring car.

Miss Byrnes said she was dragged from the car, and that one of the negroes struck her over the head with his fist. She screamed, and finally was thrown in the roadway, while the ne-

groes escaped. Two men walking nearby heard her screams and found her in a slightly dazed condition, but otherwise unharmed.

She reported the attack to a patrolman, who advised her to go to the station. She said the chauffeur in whose cab she was riding refused to help, and drove away when she was thrown into the street.






