Screen Stars to Cross Continent for Charity Fete

Merchants Also Promise Aid in Drive for Funds for 'A. I. C. P.'

At the office of Will H. Hays, president of the Motion Picture Producers, Distributors and Exhibitors organization, it was announced yesterday that the great stars in the film front plan to attend the motion picture carnival, popularity contest and charity ball, to take place here from April 29 to May 9 for the benefit of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor.

One telegram received by Mr. Hays, which was signed by seventeen stars, stated that they were coming to New York in a body from Los Angeles and that they wanted to award a prize of a trip to Hollywood for the person selling the most votes in the motion picture popularity contest.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Courtland D. Barnes, chairman of the carnival executive committee, and Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt 2d, chairman of the committee on the sale of tickets, plans were worked out yesterday by which hundreds of young women employed in New York business houses are forming themselves into "little flying squadrons of the poor" and next week will set forth selling votes at ten cents each for the most popular motion picture star.

Other stars who expect to be in New York during the carnival are William Farnum, Charles Hutchison, Jackie Coogan, Wesley Barry and Norma and Constance Talmadge. Screen players will mix with the crowd in the street and urge them to contribute what they can toward helping the poor.
