

**MOTORS KILL FOUR
IN CITY'S STREETS**

**Nurse, Man and Two Boys
Meet Death—One Arrest
Only Is Reported.**

**TEN HURT IN COLLISION
Trolley and Bus in Smashup
at Amsterdam Avenue
Crossing.**

Miss Mary Elizabeth Craig, 66 for many years a nurse in the home of Herbert E. Smythe at 317 West Seventy-first street, was on her way to his home just after midnight yesterday after a visit to her brother in Jersey City when an automobile struck her at Seventieth street and West End avenue. The car was speeding on its way south in the avenue. The woman died within a few minutes and her body was removed to Roosevelt Hospital where it was identified in the afternoon by Mrs. Smythe.

Detectives trailed the automobile to Fifty-ninth street, where all trace of it was lost. Stephen Salmere, 11, was crossing Fourth avenue, Brooklyn, near Eighteenth street last night when he was struck by an automobile owned and operated by John Dougherty of 494 Lexington avenue. Dougherty took the boy to the Samaritan Hospital, but he was dead. A policeman who saw the accident exonerated Dougherty and he was allowed to go.

A Ninth avenue surface car crashed into a city bus crossing its track at Amsterdam avenue and Seventy-ninth street early in the morning. The bus was not returned, but its window panes were shattered and its dozen or more passengers were thrown from their seats. Ten suffered minor injuries. Six were carried into a nearby hallway where they were attended by an ambulance physician from Knickerbocker Hospital.

Francis Costello, 13, of 54 West 129th street, was run over and killed by a motor truck at Queens Boulevard and Bets avenue, Long Island City, in the afternoon. The driver of the truck was Fred Bruise of 161 Dupont street, Brooklyn.

A man believed to have been William Roystone, 55, of 269 West Thirty-fourth street, was killed at Sixth avenue and Forty-third street last night when struck by an automobile that was being driven north in the avenue by Samuel Hauptman of 232 East 165th street. Roystone was among a large crowd of persons waiting at the east corner of Forty-third street for an opportunity to cross Sixth avenue. When he attempted to dart between Hauptman's car and another motor just ahead of it he was knocked down and run over. Dr. Russell of New York Hospital found him dead upon arrival. Hauptman was arrested on a technical charge of homicide. Papers found in the pockets of the dead man showed that he had filed patent specifications for an illuminated sign.

**THEATERS HELPING
SALVATION APPEAL**

**Hayward Tells of Lassie Who
Disobeyed Order at Front.**

To-morrow the Salvation Army enters the theaters of New York city for a week of intensive appeal to enlist the millions of patrons of the city-wide campaign now in progress for funds to continue its local program of service.

Lee Shubert, who is serving as chairman of the theatrical division in the Army's campaign organization, is giving the fullest possible cooperation in all the Shubert theaters, and Marcus Loew has opened to the Army the thirty Loew theaters of New York city. Jesse Lasky and Will Hays are both helping the Army in its appeal by serving on the citizens' committee in charge of the program of organization.

At the Winter Garden the appeal will be presented by a Salvation Army lassie who has the unique distinction of being the only member of the Salvation Army who ever disobeyed an order. She is Staff Capt. Mrs. Beatrice Hammond, Col. William Hayward, who is serving on the citizens' committee, tells the story.

"She was serving hot coffee to the boys at the front," said Col. Hayward. "I ordered her to go back, because to stay meant practically certain death. But she flatly refused to obey. She stayed. And the boys had their coffee."

A number of members of the Junior League are working tirelessly with the Women's Division of the Salvation Army. Among the most active workers are Miss Margaret Wheeler and Miss Natalie Robert.

Bird S. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Welfare, who is treasurer of the Municipal Group, which includes the heads of more than forty different city departments, reports a gratifying response to the effort to raise funds.

**ONE OF HIS LEGAL WIVES
IS SUING FOR \$500,000**

**Youngstown Woman Asks
Damages for Alienation.**

WARREN, Ohio, May 6.—Stasia Welsh Wells of Youngstown, first wife of Thomas Wells, "millionaire sergeant" who is said to be the only man in the United States with two legal wives, filed suit here to-day, asking \$500,000 damages against Mr. and Mrs. Richard Garlick of Youngstown, charging alienation of affections. Mrs. Garlick is a sister of Wells. Mr. Garlick was treasurer of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company until recently.

Wells got a divorce last year from his first wife. The Appellate Court reversed the decision, but meanwhile Wells had married a woman who nursed him in a New York sanitarium. The case now is awaiting decision by the Ohio Supreme Court.

**'I AM DEAD!' HE SHOUTS
TOO SOON IN SUICIDE**

LOUISIANA'S BIG SUGAR CROP.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Louisiana's 1921 sugar crop was the largest in ten years, the Department of Agriculture announced to-day. Its final report on last year's cane harvest placed the output at 324,431 tons of sugar and 6,154,383 gallons of molasses, compared with 189,127 tons of sugar and 4,639,835 gallons of syrup in 1920.
