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MARRIAGE PASTOR'S ACTS ARE UPHOLD

Presbyterian Assembly, However, Sustains Dissolving of Church Relations.

DES MOINES, Ia., May 24 (Associated Press).—The Rev. John McElmoyre was guilty of no offense against the church when he married 1,000 couples in a year and gave his town, Elkton, Md., the name of the "Gretchen Green of the East," was the finding late today of the judicial commission of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.

The commission cleared the Rev. Mr. McElmoyre, but sustained the act of the Presbytery of Newcastle in dissolving his pastoral relations with his church.

Most of the marriages performed by the Rev. Mr. McElmoyre joined soldiers, many of them from Camp Mead, Md., in wedlock with young women of the Baltimore district.

The commission upheld the action of the Presbytery "for the good of their territory," but added that McElmoyre was fully qualified to occupy any other Presbyterian pulpit.

After a disappearance which has lasted ten years, the name of the Rev. Ernest C. Bartle, was removed from the rolls of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, without prejudice to him, Mr. Bartlett dropped from sight in 1912.

An overture to make the term of Commissioners to the General Assembly two years instead of one, referred to the presbyteries a year ago, was defeated by 22 yeas to 21.

Women were made eligible to serve as deacons by a vote of the Presbyteries of 50 to 52. By an oversight, however, the ordinance ceremony was permitted to retain the word "brother" instead of "sister," and another vote will be necessary.

Uncertainty was caused among the Northern Presbyterians by a message from the Southern Presbyterians at Charleston, W. Va., which said that the latter "accepts the decision of the former in regard to 'brother' as the general council of the Reformed Church in America." It was not clear, it was said, whether the Southern denomination thus adopted membership in the general council of the Reformed Church from which they are now the only branch holding themselves aloof. A request for more specific word was sent to Charleston.

CAMBRIDGE, Ohio, May 24.—The Rev. J. Kelly Griffen of the Sudan, Egypt, for many years the directing head of the Tourist's list, selected moderator of the United Presbyterian Church of North America at the opening session of the sixty-fourth General Assembly of the church here to-night.

WOMEN FORM LEAGUE OPPOSED TO 'FANATICS' Miss Marbury Chosen President of Anti-Reform Society.

The Anti-Fanatic League of Women, opposed to all that the professional reformer stands for, got under way last night at a meeting held in Khen's Chop House, 107 West Forty-fourth street.

Miss Elizabeth Marbury was elected honorary president on the suggestion of Miss Dorothy Richmond Hill, 1-1, who gave her profession as dramatist and writer. Miss Doran was elected secretary and the active chairman is Miss Belle Norton of 54 West Sixty-fifth street, Deputy Sheriff of New York county.

Mrs. Stuyvesant Wainwright, recently married to the father of Carroll Wainwright, husband of Edith Gould, was one of the most interesting of those present but she was called away before the league got down to dues and election of officers.

The platform of the league says the members are to work for the repeal of every suppressive law approved by fanatics, reformers, uplifters and censors; to denounce such laws as unjust, to declare themselves opposed to the "colossal act as the most 'intemperate and harmful piece of sumptuary legislation ever inflicted on the people,' to oppose the nomination and election of all persons who favor prohibition and blue laws, and to favor the use of wine, beer, alcoholic beverages, tea, coffee, tobacco, indoor, outdoor and Sunday amusements.

UPHOLDS MOROSCO DIVORCE. Detroit Court Decides Theatrical Manager Proved Residence There.

DETROIT, May 24.—The decree of divorce granted to Mrs. Anna T. Mitchell, upon the heels of which her former husband, Oliver Morosco, theatrical producer, married Miss Selma Paley in Los Angeles, was upheld by Circuit Judge Dingemann here today.

Legality of the divorce was brought into question on the ground that Morosco had not proved a two years' residence in Michigan. Affidavits submitted by Morosco were declared to-day by Edward Pokorny, "friend of the court," to prove the legality of his residence.

MOROSCO FILED A BILL FOR DIVORCE, but the decree was granted to his wife on a cross bill. The court action was taken in the family name, Mitchell.

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REPORT IS PUBLISHED ON ROCKEFELLER FUND

Vincent Tells of Large Sums Spent by Foundation.

The first installment of a review of the recent activities of the Rockefeller Foundation, written by its president, George E. Vincent, was made public yesterday. It summarizes the work done by the foundation and its agencies, the International Health Board, the China Medical Board and the Division of Medical Education.

In 1921 the foundation continued its annual appropriation of \$50,000 to the school of hygiene and public health of Johns Hopkins, pledged \$20,000 to Harvard for a school of health and gave to Harvard \$10,000 to permit the expansion of a course in health training into a school of public health.

Other contributions and activities in line with the world wide fight of the foundation against disease are: Pledged \$10,000 for the medical school of Columbia University; contracted to rebuild the hospital and medical school of the Free University of Brussels; continued the campaign against yellow fever in Mexico and South America; contributed to and aided in organizing clinics and training stations in China, Brazil, Czechoslovakia and the United States, and, in addition, conducted all kinds of medical and scientific work.
