

J. B. Bourne and Miss Julia Belrose Secretly Married

News of Ceremony by Greenwich Justice of Peace Surprises Their Friends.

Mr. Joseph Baker Bourne of this city and Miss Julia Belrose, daughter of the late Louis Belrose of Washington, D. C., were married in Greenwich, Conn., last Sunday. Announcement of the marriage will come as a great surprise to many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Bourne here and abroad. No announcement of the engagement had been made.

This is Mr. Bourne's second marriage. His former wife, who was Miss Julia Chapin, a daughter of Mr. Chester Chapin, first became the wife of the Marquis de la Tour du Villard from whom she secured a divorce in 1917. About two years after that she was married to Mr. Bourne from whom she secured a divorce after thirteen months. A year ago last winter Mrs. Bourne was married in Greenwich to Mr. Benoni Lockwood, Jr., who had been twice in the divorce courts. Mr. Lockwood and his third wife now are living in Quilo, Ecuador.

Mrs. Bourne, the bride of last Sunday, is quite young and about the age of her husband's daughter, who was introduced to society two years ago. She is the daughter of the late Louis Belrose and of Mrs. Belrose of Washington, D. C., and a sister of Mrs. Belrose, Mrs. Lockwood and his third wife now are living in Quilo, Ecuador.

Mr. Bourne comes of a family for years identified with New York and Staten Island and has lived much in France. During the war he was for two years in the American Expeditionary Force serving as Captain of Infantry. For services rendered to France he was awarded by the French Government the Legion of Honor and the Croix de Guerre.

LONDON, May 29 (Associated Press).—The first week of London's season opened today in a blaze of sunshine, when King George held his first levee at Buckingham Palace with all the pomp and ceremony of the days before the war. George Harvey, the American Ambassador, and the other Ambassadors and envoys accredited to the Court of St. James's were present, together with a brilliant representation of society.

The great houses in the vicinity of Epsom are giving special dinners and luncheons daily, while the West End hotels are arranging for gala dinners throughout the week. Saturday will give the general public an opportunity to witness the "trooping of the colors" in honor of the King's birthday at the Horse Guards' parade, where the King, the Queen and other members of the royal family will be present.

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King's Levee at Buckingham Opens Season Brilliantly

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William T. Abbott, Banker, Dies at 54, After an Operation

Vice-President of the Central Trust Co. of Chicago Taken Ill Ten Days Ago.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—William T. Abbott, 54, banker and member of the Tax Simplification Board, died today. He became ill on May 18 as he was leaving the Treasury Building to take a train for his home in Chicago. His operation was performed by Dr. Abbott was First Assistant Director of the Bureau of the Budget until January 1, when he resigned to resume his business. He was vice-president of the Central Trust Company of Chicago.

Mr. Abbott was born in Wells River, Vt. He went through college and then became an instructor in Manchester High School for two years. He entered the law firm of Stevens, Horton & Abbott in Peoria, Ill., in 1894, and in 1909 he was elected to the Illinois State Bar. He studied political conditions. His knowledge of conditions there proved valuable when he became a campaigner for the Republican National Committee in 1904.

Mr. Abbott created a stir in banking circles a few years ago in his fight against itinerant bankers. At that time he was a member of the Chicago and Illinois State Bar Associations, and of the University, Union League, Bankers, Evanston Country and Skokie Golf Clubs of Chicago.
