MOTHER-IN-LAW LAYS FRAUD TO FAVERSHAM

Mrs. Opp Asks Court to Set Aside Deeds She Signed.

William Faversham, the actor, was sued yesterday in the Supreme Court individually and as executor of the will of his wife, Julie Opp Faversham, by his mother-in-law, Mrs. Mary Opp, who seeks to set aside an alleged executor's deed, and alleged quit claim deed and two mortgages involving family property in Seventeenth street, near Rutherford road.

Mrs. Opp sets forth that upon representation of her daughter and son-in-law in 1902 that they were in need of funds, she desired to mortgage the family property she was induced to sign certain instruments the exact nature and scope of which she did not understand.

Because of her lack of knowledge of real estate transactions, she explains that she relied on her daughter and son-in-law and believed the latter by virtue of "extensive experience in worldly affairs" was acting in good faith.
