

### 900 RIOT ON CRUISE OF HUDSON 'PIRATES'

Bottle of Scotch, 'Half Portion' Called Edith and a Badge Start Rumpus.

### ALL FIGHTING AT ONCE

Volstead's Self-Confessed 'Favorite Son' Gets All He Wants for Once.

### ONE BULLET ENDS ORGY

Sam Schwartz of Lower Manhattan Still Wonders How He Can Pay for Ship.

A bottle of alleged Scotch, a nickel-plated badge, a half portion of stewed chicken, an officer in the United States Marines and a wide difference of opinion resulted in the shooting of John F. Sullivan during Sam Schwartz's pirates' cruise on the steamship Mandalay Friday night.

However, it appears that the Mandalay, bearing Sam and about 900 cash customers, were on their way back from a point opposite West Point, in the Hudson River. It was agreed that there were some aboard who had defied the law by bringing liquor on what was to be an utterly decorous and non-shooting party.

Out on deck the carefree pirates danced and sang, ignorant of the blood sweating of Sam Schwartz. Now and then arguments arose, only to be tut-tutted down by peacemakers.

Marine Is a Stern Critic. There was one party well up forward that was larger than the others. The marine is said to have dominated it. To join it one had to pass his inspection and he is said to have been a stern critic.

Came the half portion Edith applying for admittance to the select circle. Her credentials consisted of a quantity of authoritative stuff in a bottle. She was dragged into the circle, balanced on a table, relieved of her bottle and asked to sing. She began her song, only to be interrupted by a mature but thinly clad female who demanded the bottle, claiming it as hers.

In the midst of the brawl there appeared a large and commanding pirate whose feet trod her. Now and then a plate or his lady would trip over her. That made no difference to Edith. She had passed the stage where a kick in her poorly padded ribs was to be taken seriously.

Wins a Second Bottle. He is alleged to have bagged another merry party, winning a second bottle. He was retiring to his drinking friends when the marine and the original bunch revived. It is alleged that they fell upon Mr. Volstead's favorite boy with awful fury. They buried him and his friends under themselves. The second party joined the fracas.

The Mandalay stopped at 132d street, where Sullivan was helped ashore by two friends, who described themselves as Michael Hotrick, 25, Greenwich street, and James Russell, 152 Franklin street. A patrolman called an ambulance. All but thirty of the pirates and their ladies disembarked at the same time. The Mandalay arrived at her Battery berth in great silence.

### HEAVEN, THEN INSANITY IN HIS FLYING CIGARETTES'

Man Charged With Peddling Mexican Smokes That Give Beautiful Dreams of Sweet Music and Lovely Maidens, but There's a Final Tragic Kick.

Leonido Romero, aged 45, a Spanish seaman living at Jane and West streets, was arrested yesterday in a room at 666 Washington street by detectives of the Narcotic Squad, charged with selling "flying cigarettes," made from a compound of tobacco and the Mexican marihuana.

Passenger's Brother Held for Homicide and Intoxication After Mishap.

Harry Smith, 23, of 843 West 179th street, riding in a taxicab driven by his brother, James Smith, 35, of 139 Edgecombe avenue, suffered injuries that resulted in his death yesterday when the cab ran against an elevated railroad pillar at Third avenue and Forty-seventh street. The brother was arrested on a charge of homicide and intoxication, but protested that the cab had skidded on the pavement, causing it to crash against the pillar.

### EX-STRIKE BREAKER KILLS DOCK WORKER

Negro Knocks Down Assailant, Whose Skull Is Fractured on Pavement.

Louis Capartis, aged 30, a longshoreman of 444 Greenwich street, was killed yesterday in a fight with Cecil Bell, aged 27, a negro, of 252 West 132d street. The negro, who was arrested by Patrolman Hughes and held without bail by Magistrate Hatting in Yorkville court, said that Capartis had nursed a grudge against him because he remained at work last year while the white longshoremen went on strike.

### KIDNAPING SLAYER RECEIVES REPRIEVE

Raffaello, Who Killed Varotta Boy, Gives Evidence Against Rest of the Gang.

Sing Sing attendants announced yesterday that for four months' reprieve had been granted by Gov. Miller to Roberto Raffaello, the Manhattan kidnaper. The order means that four instead of five persons will be executed Thursday. Raffaello was reported to have turned over to District Attorney Banton's office information incriminating other members of the band implicated in the kidnaping and killing of five-year-old Giuseppe Varotta.

### TRAPPED IN ATTEMPT TO ROB PRIEST OF \$5,750

Youth Uses Phone and Calls at Sacred Heart Rectory.

Samuel Liberman, 21, plumber, of 206 West Sixty-ninth street, was arrested yesterday in the rectory of the Church of the Sacred Heart of Jesus charged with an attempt to rob the Rev. Francis Corcoran of \$5,750 and fifty shares of stock of the Motion Picture Advertising Company.
