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John Bensel Dies, Ex-State Engineer and McClellan Aid

Had Been Mentioned as Democratic Candidate for Governor.

John A. Bensel, former State Engineer and member of the Board of Water Supply, died yesterday in his home in Bernardsville, N. J.

He was looked upon as the right hand man of Mayor McClellan when the latter was in City Hall.

Mr. Bensel died much of the letting of contracts and construction of the Catskill aqueduct.

Mr. Bensel was born in this city August 16, 1863, the son of Brownies and Mrs. Mary Maclay Bensel.

He entered the Department of Docks and Harbors in 1889 as an assistant engineer and six years later he retired to take up engineering as a private practice.

In January, 1908, Mr. Bensel succeeded J. Edward Simmons on the Board of Water Supply.

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
